Social Rules One Facet In Student Affairs Code

(Ed. note: The Emerald is printing the complete context of the Student Affairs code so that all students may be acquainted with its provisions.)

In addition to the student discipline code printed in Wednesday's Emerald, there is another code of rules, regulations, and procedures governing student affairs.

It is formulated by the student affairs committee, which is composed of faculty members D. M. DuShane, director of student affairs, chairman; R. C. Williams, secretary; N. R. Hawk, director of men's affairs; Golda Parker Wickham, director of women's affairs; W. C. Jones, dean of administration, ex-officio, non-voting, and A. B. Stillman, professor in business administration; and student members Pat Dignan, senior in law; Clyde Fahlman, senior in sociology; Sarah Turnbull, senior in foreign languages, and Patricia Ward, senior in general social science.

The Code

The following are the provisions of the code:

It is the wish of the student affairs committee that the University of Oregon shall entertain with dignity and simplicity and conform to the accepted tenets of good taste prevailing in the community.

The following rules, regulations and procedures governing social life at the University of Oregon as formulated by the student affairs committee supersede all earlier rules, regulations and procedures. The Committee has authority over all student affairs and is particularly charged with the prevention of interference with scholastic work.

They are listed here as briefly and as concisely as possible. All students attending the University are urged to acquaint themselves with the following:

I. General Policies of the Student Affairs Committee:

- The student affairs committee authorizes its chairman, the director of men's affairs and/or the director of women's affairs to implement and administer the general policies and business of this committee, with power to make minor adjustments in policy and decisions concerning matters which do not seem important enough to bring before the full committee.
- The director of men's affairs, the director of women's affairs and the Student Union director may revise specific dates appearing on the yearly social calendar approved by this committee, provided that such changes are within the policies established by this committee.
- Every social event must be registered in the office of the director of women's affairs not later than 5 p.m. of the Monday preceding the event except that stag affairs are registered in the office of the director of men's affairs.
- The closed period for all events is from 5 p.m. of the third day prior to the first day of the examination period through the examination period.
- The student affairs committee recognizes the need and desirability for proper and accurate accounting of all student funds. Accordingly, it urges all student organizations to deposit their funds with the Student Union office to insure safe-keeping and proper accounting of income and expenses. This service is offered without charge to all organizations.
 - The advisor is expected to exercise reasonable supervision over the finances of the organization. If the organization's funds are held in trust by the Student Union, the advisor shall issue purchase requisitions on forms provided by the Student Union, or approve for payment bills for purchases made without requisitions.
 - The Student Union is expected to prepare for the advisor a financial statement of the trust fund as of the end of each term.
- Student organizations, as this committee has always understood and applied the term, are organizations of regularly enrolled students which function within the University family and which satisfy some need or meet some problem connected with student life in the University community.
 - They are an integral part of student life on the campus. They function within their own proper sphere and contribute to the well-being of the University as a whole.
 - By their very nature and by the fact that they exist within a state, tax-supported institution, their purposes, their objectives and their actions are necessarily limited.
 - They cannot be used as implementive agencies for off-campus purposes, nor can they function, using the University's name, prestige, or facilities, as sounding boards, propaganda devices, or bases of action for the policies, programs, or interests of non-campus organizations.

(The legitimate existence of student organizations affiliated with the national political parties is provided for elsewhere under the regulations and policies of this committee.)

II. Hours:

- Closing hours are: 10:30 p.m. Sunday through Thursday; 1 a.m. Friday and Saturday.
- Social events after 7:30 p.m. may be held on Friday and Saturday only.
- Exchange desserts may be held in the living organizations Wednesday from 6:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m., but no time may be spent in preparation for such events. Open houses may be held on Wednesday from 6:30 p.m. or Friday or Saturday nights.
- All functions held on Friday and Saturday nights must terminate at 1 a.m.
- Hours during which men are allowed in women's houses are as follows:

Monday through Thursday: Noon-1 p.m.; 4-7:30 p.m.; 10-10:30 p.m.
 Friday: Noon-1 p.m.; 4 p.m.-1 a.m.
 Saturday: Noon-1 a.m.
 Sunday: Noon-8 p.m.; 10-10:30 p.m.

quired to initiate amendments to the constitution, which provides for senate membership. The proposal would have included all fifth-year students, whether or not they had a degree.

ASUO President Pat Dignan's presentation of his budget report for 1952-53 touched off a slow-fusing but eventually igniting discussion on who has the authority to form the budget. The ASUO constitution provides only that the president submit to the senate at the start of each year an estimate of his budget, and, at the start of winter and spring terms, a report of previous terms expenditures.

It was the general conclusion that the senate has no legal authority over the budget, but it has moral power. This caused some musing in the light of last spring's hassle over a motion to cut the president's salary (which is now \$600 per year). Some senators voiced a desire for more authority, and the matter was sent to constitutional committee for consideration.

The \$600 president's salary is the largest budget item, followed by his secretary's \$250 and \$200 for sending delegates to the Pacific Student President's association convention.
