Troops Launch 'Heaviest' Assault

(AP)—Allied troops in Korea have launched what is believed their heaviest assault since the fighting for Heartbreak ridge began one year ago.

Allied infantry opened a smashing attack at dawn in the central sector some 17 miles east of White Horse mountain. It was preceded by a heavy pounding of the Communist positions by the Allied artillery and tank guns.

A part of the attack was directed against the Triangle hill, a Communist position in the old iron triangle area. The first lines of the Allied infantry stormed to the top of the hill, before the Reds rallied and hurled back the attackers.

Allied troops moved swiftly in a pre-dawn mist across a valley to prepare for the assault on the ridge line. After three and a half hours the Allies were pinned down on the mountain slope by grenades and mortar fire.

At White Horse Mountain, victorious South Korean troops moved down so-called Red suicide squad attackers and pounded the last Communist foothold on that peak.

Ike Draws Big Crowd

(AP)—Some 15,000 persons applauded Dwight D. Eisenhower Monday night in New Orleans when he stated that the Truman administration has given the South a shoddy deal.

Eisenhower said that the battle over tidelands is, in fact, an entering wedge for government control of the resources in rivers and lakes. "If they take the Louisiana, Texas and California, tidelands, then what about the Great Lakes?" added Eisenhower. "They have been held to be open sea. A good part of Chicago has been built on land once submerged by Lake Michigan."

He mentioned also the iron and coal deposits in Minnesota and Pennsylvania, and the Florida fisheries. He also said that he will always resist federal encroachment on the rights and affairs of the state and that he is gravely concerned over what he terms "the threat to the states inherent in their growth". Ike also declared in a major bid to win the Southern votes that his opponent, Stevenson, has proved to the hilt the administration arrogance to the South.

Lewis Supports Demo Nominee

(AP)—John L. Lewis, the chief of the United Mine Workers, joined the presidential campaign yesterday with a cheer for Governor Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic presidential candidate.

This is the first time in 16 years he has gone solidly for the Democratic ticket. Lewis told his coal union convention in Cincinnati that Stevenson is a humanitarian and Eisenhower is another Oliver Cromwell—a man who ruled England with an iron fist for years.

Russia Rejects U.S. Complaint

(AP)—The Soviet Union has rejected the American complaint over the way the Russians got rid of the United States Ambassador to Russia, George Kennan.

The official Soviet news agency, TASS, reports that a few hours ago the Russians delivered to our embassy in Moscow a message referring to the American protest as a worthless effort to justify a false and hostile statement by Kennan.

The ambassador was quoted during a visit to Berlin last month as saying that life for a United States official in Moscow nowadays is like life when the Nazis interned our diplomats during the war.

Nixon Says Adlai Disqualified Now

(AP)—The Republican vice-presidential candidate, Senator Richard Nixon, said in a nationwide radio and television broadcast Monday night that Governor Stevenson's views on Communists in government disqualify him from leading the government.

Nixon complained that Stevenson never expressed any indignation about what Alger Hiss did, and charged that the Governor treated the Communist threat very lightly in his campaign.

Nixon announced earlier that he does not plan to make public his income tax returns as was done by Governor Stevenson and Senator Sparkman. He declared that his finances are a completely closed issue.

More Pogo Buttons Available for Fans

Joe Harden, unofficial chairman of the Oregon "I Go Pogo" fan club, announced yesterday that a new supply of Pogo buttons will be in the co-op next week.

For those who aren't in the know, Pogo is the comic strip character created by Walt Kelly. Currently, the precocious 'possum is running for president. The buttons are to advertise his campaign and identify his supporters on the campus.

First shipment of the buttons ordered by Harden were gone in three days. Answering the demand of politically minded students, he ordered a second shipment of 1,000 buttons from New York. A letter from Kelly confirming the order reached the campus this week, and, if all goes well, the Pogo-for-president movement will get an added impetus next week.

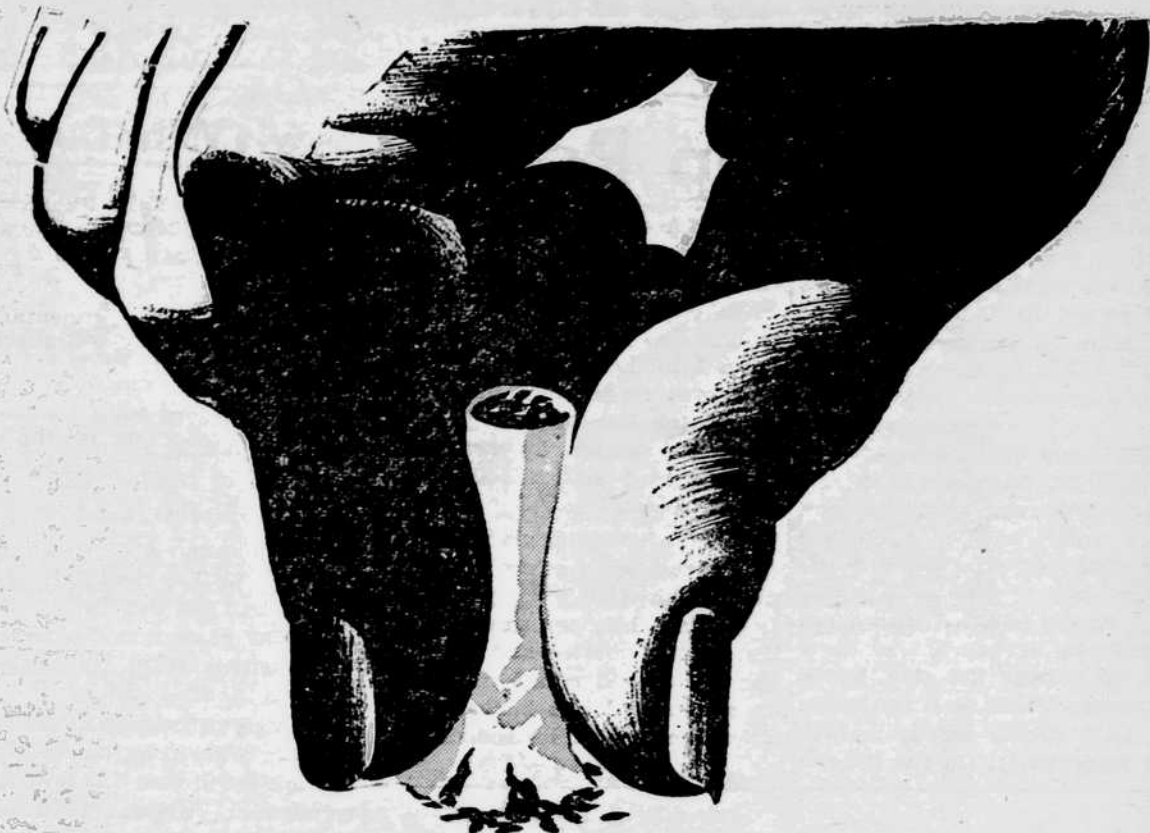
