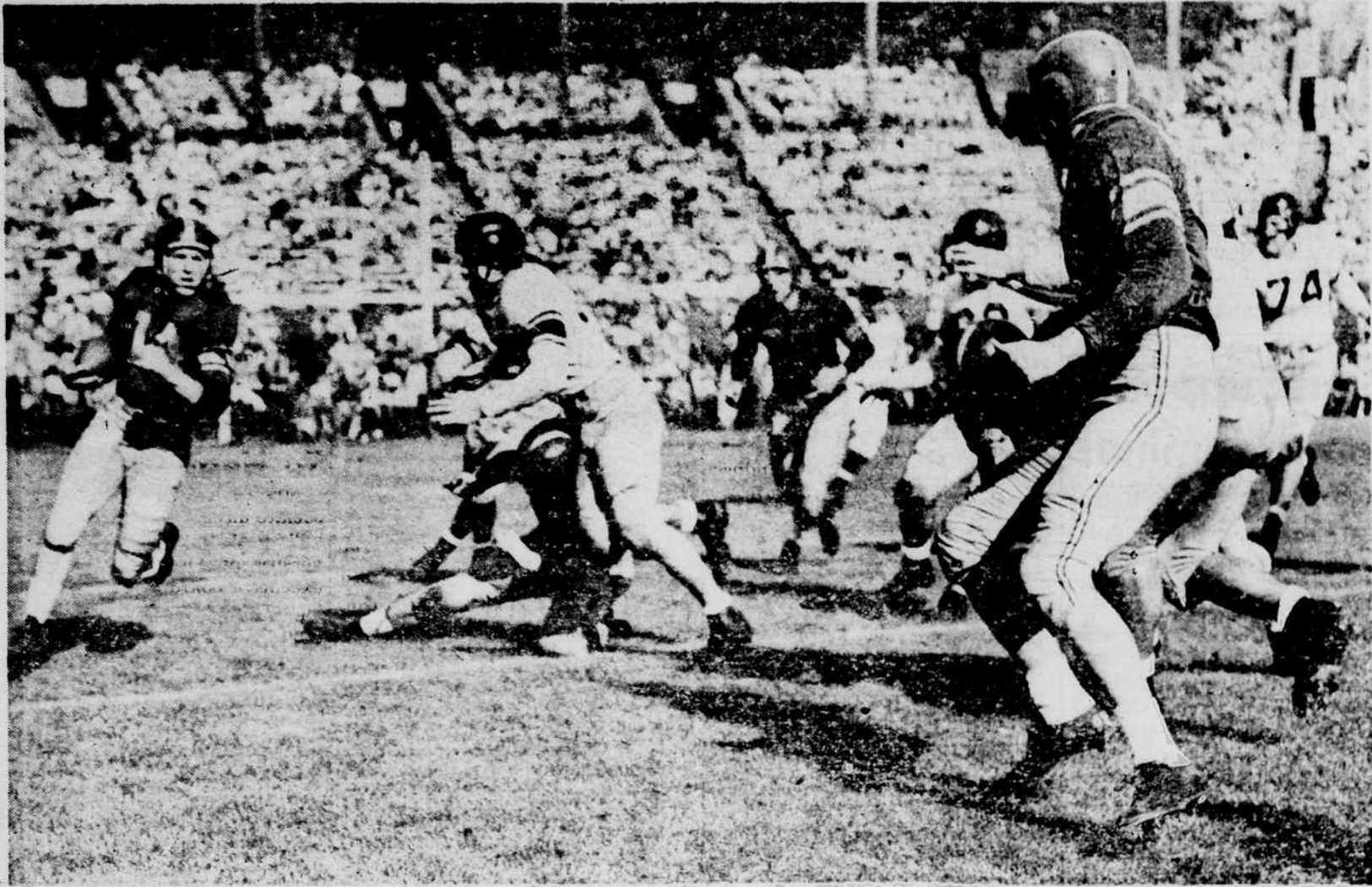


Bears Paw Ducks---in Second Half

Ducklings Slap Rooks

The Oregon State Rooks bowed, 21-0 before a much classier Oregon Frosh team Friday afternoon at Hayward field. The frosh, in their first tilt this season, allowed the OSC rookies a net yardage of six yards for sixty minutes of play. In yards gained rushing the Ducklings were on top 292 to a minus 13. Significant in the Rooks' defeat was Oregon's Dick Pavlat, a left half, who crashed for a total of 90 yards in the game.

Dick James followed with a net 74 yards 45 of which was on a single breakaway TD play. Larry Rose, fullback and Meb Buchanan right half, rushed for 54 and 49 yards respectively. On the Oregon

State side of the picture Stewart, the fullback, went 27 yards for the leading ground gainer honors while on the other side of the picture Mel McCain was thrown for a total loss of 62 yards. McCain was rushed and tagged far behind the line of scrimmage on attempted passes by the Duckling forward wall several times in the game.

The frosh scoring started in the first period when Larry Rose went over from the nine yard line. Larios set him up again in the last of the quarter and Rose began the second period by scoring on a two-yard line buck. On another line crash Rose scored from

Lewis Wins Duel

French Tips Merrick For Frosh IM Crown

French Hall won the right to represent the freshman class in intra-mural championship play by edging Merrick hall, 7-6, in a close, hard fought game yesterday. In fraternity action, Sigma Phi Epsilon downed Lambda Chi Alpha, 16-0

The French-Merrick encounter, was a battle between the two passing backs, Loyd Lewis of French hall and Bob Talbot of Merrick. The game was a close affair with neither team being able to score in the first half.

Merrick threatened, however, when it drove from its own thirty to the French five. The march was terminated when "Frenchman" Kieth Gove intercepted a pass. Backing this drive were Talbot and his receiver Garry McFarland. Both boys played on last year's Grants Pass eleven.

Intercepted Pass

Merrick Hall was the first to score in the second half, with Frank Pritchard intercepting a French pass on the enemy thirty and running it all the way for a Merrick T.D. The try for extra point failed.

With three minutes left in the period French caught fire. Quarterback Lewis hitting end Carscadon with three consecutive tosses. A pass to Dell Rose from the Merrick three netted the French goal. French put over the all important extra point making the score 7-6.

Frank Case, Ric Erikson, and Blake Bodes, were defensive stars in the French line.

Beta Theta Pi, paced by its passing and running star Bob Stout, scored an easy victory over Phi Kappa Sigma, 19 to 2, in another game played Monday afternoon.

An intercepted pass on the 40 yard line, a quick first down, and a 20 yard aerial thrown from Stout to Harlin Mickey gave the Beta's an early 6-0 lead in the first period.

Midway through the second quarter Stout set up the second touchdown. This time he intercepted a pass thrown by Bob Hinman and ran 38 yards to pay-dirt. A short pass from Stout to end

Shaw Sets Mark; Berkeley Crew Grabs Fourth Win

PORTLAND — After battling to a 7-7 deadlock in the first half, California's Golden Bears unleashed a vicious ground attack to bury the University of Oregon 41-7 Saturday.

Sophomore quarterback George Shaw, drawing his first offensive starting assignment of the season, was nothing short of sensational for the Webfoots as he completed 23 passes out of 50 attempts, erasing the week-old record of 21 completions set by Washington's Don Heinrich against UCLA. This was Oregon's only solace after the first half.

The crowd of 17,793 was both surprised and delighted as Oregon fought toe-to-toe with the vaunted Californians until the lack of reserve strength took its toll. However, fans can be proud of Oregon's performance for they still looked good in defeat. Johnny Olszewski was the big

gun for Cal, and it looked as if the Bears were going to have a field day as "Johnny O" took a pitchout behind blocks by Glenn Gulvin and Don Johnson and went around right end for 32 yards and a touchdown with only 3:48 gone in the first period.

Staunch Defense

But California's field day did not materialize as Oregon's front line of Emery Barnes, Jack Patena, Len Berrie, Hal Simmons, Hal Reeve, Emmett Williams, et al rose up time and time again to throw the Bear backs for losses. In fact, it was touch and go right up to the halftime gun with Oregon managing to even things up during the first 30 minutes.

Oregon's scoring drive started when Johnson fumbled, Barnes recovering on the Oregon 41-yard line. Shaw then proceeded to fire strikes to ends Monte Brethauer and Ron Lyman which ate up most of the 59 yards. A California holding penalty that gave the Ducks a first down on the 17 was the big break in the drive.

After one incomplete pass, Shaw went back to throw again. This time he faked as if going to throw left to Brethauer, then pitched one to the right side of the end zone where Lyman went up between Don Harris and Sam Williams to make a great catch. Emerson Harvey kicked the extra point and California suddenly awoke to the fact that this wasn't going to be an easy afternoon's workout.

Nothing Doing

At that point there was 5:51 left in the second stanza but neither team threatened during the remaining minutes and the half ended 7-all.

It was a case of just too many horses against the tiring Webfoots in the second half. Paced by the big three of Bill Powell, (Please turn to page five)



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
