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Olszewski and Johnson, California turned the game into a rout with three touchdowns in the third quarter and two more in the fourth period.
Shaw continued to throw the ball whenever Oregon controlled it, but the Ducks couldn't keep a drive going—their offense running out of gas around the Cal 30 on several occasions.
Olszewski really carried the mail for California, totaling 172 yards in 17 carries including a 71-yard TD gallop.
In the dressing room after the game there was much re-hashing. Both coaches Len Casanova and Lynn Waldorf had nothing but praise for Shaw's passing and field generalship. Casanova said he believed that California's speed and Oregon's defensive mistakes were the main reasons for the Webfoot defeat. Waldorf was impressed with Oregon's defensive patterns.
