

Selection to Begin In 'Sweetheart' Contest

The annual contest to select the Sweetheart of Sigma Chi begins tonight at 6:30 p.m., when twenty-six candidates from all women's organizations on campus will be entertained at Sigma Chi fraternity.

The twenty-six freshmen women were each selected by a vote of the members of their respective living organizations during the past week.

The culmination of the contest will be at a radio program on Oct. 29 or 30, when the winner of the contest will be announced.

Dick Reinhardt, social chairman for the fraternity, released the following schedule of events:

October 14, the twenty-six candidates will be guests at an informal fireside in their honor.

October 16, skirts and sweaters, dancing and entertainment by members of the Sigma Chi fraternity.

October 21, a dessert for the thirteen semi-finalists. Pictures will be taken.

October 22, The semi-finalists will be guests of Sigma Chi at an informal luncheon.

October 23, fireside, very informal.

October 25, the five finalists will be informed of their selection by a serenade.

Sunday, October 28, the five finalists will attend a formal dinner to be held at the Sigma Chi house.

Tuesday, October 28, the finalists will be luncheon guests of the fraternity.

October 29 or 30, a radio program originating from the fraternity house. Each candidate will be introduced and the new Sweetheart of Sigma Chi will be announced.

November 1, the annual Sweetheart Ball, at which the new Sweetheart will be honored. The ball will be preceded by a dinner.

Chemistry Adds New Professors

Two new faculty members have joined the chemistry department, according to A. H. Kuntz, head of the department. They are Harold G. Richter and L. R. Clem.

Maryland defeated Clemson, 28 to 0, last Saturday, and Scarbath had a hand in all four touchdowns registered by the Terrapins.

King intercepted two VPI passes, setting up a Virginia touchdown each time, and then recovered a fumble which led to a third six-pointer.

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House Dance Limit Set For All Living Groups

(Ed. Note: The Emerald is printing the complete text of the Student Affairs code so that all students may be acquainted with its provisions. This is the second and final installment of the code.)

III. Social Life of Living Organizations

- Living organizations may have two major house dances a year. These dances must be held in the living quarters of the organization or in a University-controlled building and are restricted to the membership of the organization and to a normal guest list. They may be held on Saturday nights only.
- Informal house functions, such as firesides, radio or dinner dances, are restricted to Friday or Saturday nights. No time must be consumed in preparation for these events.
- Houses must be well-lighted for dances, and porch lights must be left on all evening.
- Costumes worn to dances held on campus must be in good taste.
- House guests:
 - House guests and alumni visitors are required to obey all University regulations, including closing hours; house guest and alumni privileges to be withdrawn if these regulations are violated.
 - Women are not allowed to go above the first floor of men's

Out-of-State Men Warned of Home Draft Requirements

All out-of-state men are urged by Ray Hawk, director of men's affairs, to contact their local draft boards about the number of hours they must take in order to qualify for student standing.

Hawk's warning came after two California men enrolled in the University received their draft notices apparently because they were not taking 15 hours. In Oregon, men are required to take 12 hours for student standing, but Hawk said that apparently the California boards are requiring 15 hours.

This year the University is required to report any change in the student's status, Hawk said. The University must report the number of hours the student is carrying, any course drops the student makes and his withdrawal from school, he added. Last year the University made these reports only on request.

Hawk again stressed the fact that all out-of-state men should contact their local boards for information about their requirements for student standing.

Interviews Slated For Petitioners

Interviews for ten new members on the ASUO rally board will begin today at 6:30 p.m. at 309 Student Union, it was announced by board chairman Jack Nichols.

The students who petitioned for rally board positions have been requested to be present for the interviews. Ninety-seven students petitioned for the ten positions open on the board, he said.

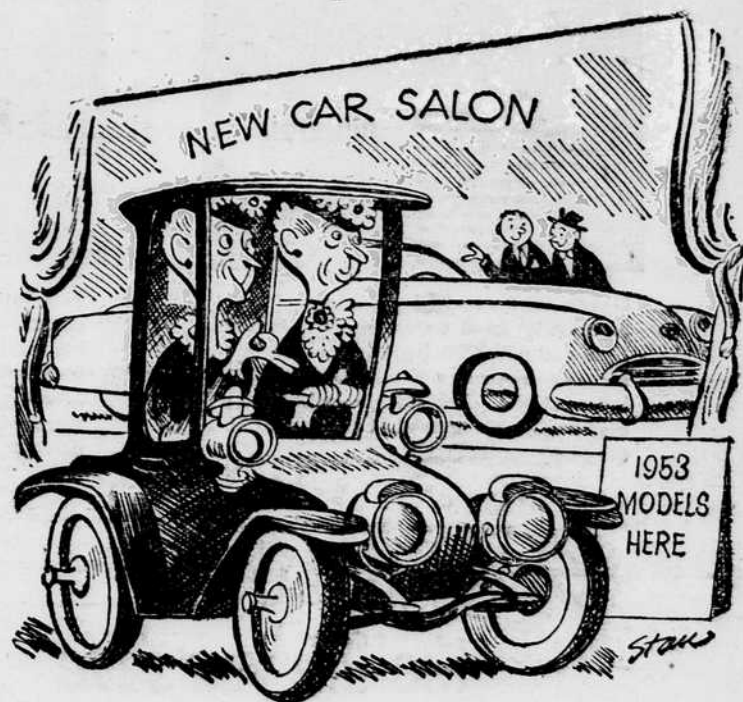
