'Husky' Passes Connect In Webfoot Scrimmage

In preparation for their Saturday battle with the University of Washington Huskies, a thin, injury-riddled University of Oregon Webfoot team began an all-out drill with the hope of ending Washington's three-game winning streak over the Ducks.

A lengthy, "stop Don Heinrich" pass session Tuesday afternoon far from pleased Coach Len Casanova and his assistants, as pass after pass was completed by the "Huskies." A group of varsity backs and ends ran Washington patterns while defensive backs Cece Hodges, Don Holt, Merritt Barber, Farrell Albright and Lloyd Powell attempted to break up the throws.

In offensive practice, the Duck regulars ran their own plays against a freshman group. Ted Anderson, halfback, was outstanding in the scrimmage as he continually ripped in and outside of tackle for long gains. Anderson, who also caught several passes from George Shaw and Hal Dunham, provided the longest run of the evening on a 90-yard jaunt. Tom Novikoff, Albright and Don Sloan stood out in the workout, as did linemen Hal Reeve, Ken Sweitzer, Ron Phiester and Emmett Williams.

The Webfoot injury list shows signs of taking in the entire roster. Tom Lyon, halfback turned guard, may be lost for the season due to a broken collar bone. Manning Barber has lost almost complete use of his right arm, and Ron Lyman, who slammed a shoulder, may miss the Washington game. Definitely lost for a good part of the season is Stan Gottschalk,

Spartans Top Poll; Cal, Troy, Bruins Rated in Top Ten

NEW YORK (AP)—The standings were drastically revised today among the leading football teams in the country, according to the weekly Associated Press poll.

Michigan State regained its standing as the number one team after a one-week drop to second. The Spartans' convincing victory over Texas A & M and Wisconsin's loss to Ohio State resulted in the change. Wisconsin had been number one, following a decision over Illinois Oct. 4. But the Badgers dropped clear down to twelfth place after bowing to the Buckeyes.

The Terrapins of Maryland took over second place from a previous fourth-place standing. California is third, followed by Georgia Tech, Duke, Oklahoma, Southern California, Kansas, Purdue and UCLA.

Among the other teams which fell out of the first 10 rankings were Notre Dame and Urinceton.

The second ten is headed by Virginia. Wisconsin is next, followed by Stanford, Penn, Villanova, Ohio State, Illinois, Alabama, Penn State and Navy.

As for Sigma Chi, they played a great game with "Lefty" Page completing several passes, mainly intended for Ed Halberg and Ron Philips, but Hale Kane's defense had all pass receivers covered so
