Warning, Pledge Ends Ike's Dixieland Tour

(AP)—Dwight D. Eisenhower closed his campaign drive through the south Wednesday with a warning and a pledge.

The warning—in Eisenhower's words—"If we are suddenly cut off from the rest of the world our entire agriculture and industrial economy would collapse."

The pledge—and again these are Eisenhower's words—"We are not going to see the breadlines again. We have pledged the full power of the government to prevent a depression."

Speaking before between 22,000 to 25,000 at Memphis, Tennessee, the heart of the Tennessee valley, Eisenhower also praised the results of the TVA.

He added, "We should not, however, look upon the TVA as a rigid pattern for such developments in other regions. In the Missouri valley many citizens are considering the possibility of a legal arrangement which would make state and federal agencies true partners in developing the resources of that great region. Our goal should be to work out river developments the way the people in the region want it done."

Stevenson Hits At 'Old Guard'

(AP)—Governor Adlai Stevenson is now campaigning in California making his second bid for the state's big prize — 32 electoral votes.

In a speech prepared for delivery Wednesday night at San Francisco, the Democratic presidential nominee hit hard at one of his favorite targets—what he calls "the old guard" around Eisenhower.

Stevenson said the group is made up of what he termed "stubborn, obstinate men who have had to be dragged, screaming and kicking, into the 20th century."

The Illinois governor said Eisenhower has rounded up a team of what Stevenson called "isolationists and cut-throat reactionaries" quarterbacked by Sen. Robert Taft of Ohio.

The Democratic nominee took a sharp dig at Eisenhower's running mate, too. Stevenson listed California Sen. Richard Nixon as left halfback on the Eisenhower team.

Stevenson then made reference to the \$18,000 fund Nixon received from political backers by saying, "We would take his enthusiasm for investigation and disclosure more seriously if he would do a more complete job on himself."

The Illinois governor flew into San Francisco late in the day after making campaign speeches in Spokane, Wash., and Pendleton, Ore.

Gromyko Demands Priority for Korea

(AP)—Russians Andrei Gromyko has demanded that the Korean war issue get first priority consideration in the United Nations. His surprise move came as Secretary of State Dean Acheson worked on a policy speech said to contain a watered-down section on Korea.

Gromyko made his demand in the assembly's steering committee. He asked that the Korean item be put first on the list of subjects to be considered by the 60-nation political committee.

Assembly President Lester Pearson of Canada, who also is chair-

man of the steering committee, said each committee would decide the order of its own business. Gromyko accepted this statement.

The Russians want the politically-charged Korean question to come up before the presidential election.

As far as Acheson toning down the Korean section of his coming policy speech, such a move would be in line with the wishes of American allies who want the crucial Korean debate to get off to a moderate start.

Chinese Forced From Two Hills

(AP)—In central Korea, the Chinese Reds are giving ground in savage fighting after losing their grip on both White Horse hill and Triangle hill. Fighting is relatively quiet elsewhere along the war-front. Allied air attacks were directed mainly at Chinese positions in the mountains and valleys of the central front.

The Chinese Communist radio has been talking for the first time as if it considers the Korean truce talks over and done with.

A Peiping broadcast called the indefinite recess an "insolent" move. The Red broadcast charged that the Americans had scuttled the talks and brought on what Peiping called "an unprecedented, serious crisis."

Pace Announces Plan For Atomic Missiles

(AP)—Secretary of the Army Frank Pace has told newsmen the Army is getting ready to fire the first atomic ammunition from its newest big gun. The huge 12-inch gun, mounted on trucks, was exhibited Wednesday at the Aberdeen proving grounds in Maryland. Pace said no atomic shells had been fired from it yet, but the gun already had been tried with a shell capable of carrying an atomic load.

The weapon was displayed Wednesday for visiting military officials, members of congress and other observers.
