

YWCA Outlines Year Of Humanitarian Work

The first meeting of the YWCA Service committee will be held today at 4 p.m. in the YW headquarters at Gerlinger, Sharon Anderson, committee chairman announced.

Miss Anderson outlined some of the plans for a program of widely varied interests for the committee work.

The program, she outlined, includes work at the Skipworth Juvenile Detention home, the Spastic Children's hospital, the West 11th st. project and the nursery school.

The Skipworth Juvenile Detention home, located outside Springfield, provides temporary housing for Lane County youngsters who are awaiting placement by the courts. Every Tuesday night from 7-9 the YW aids in their recreation program.

Along this same line is the Big Sister program. Under the direction of Mrs. Helen Stadler at the Lane County court house, the YW assists in the rehabilitation of previously delinquent children, by becoming friendly with them, and helping them whenever possible.

The work done in previous years at the Spastic Children's hospital will also be continued this year by the service committee. They assist in feeding the children on Friday noons. There are also opportunities for girls with special skills to spend an afternoon a week teaching.

The West 11th st. settlement, located at the edge of Eugene is a Negro district. The project last year was to help rebuild and redecorate a recreation center there. This year they hope to carry on an evening recreation program.

KWAX to Furnish Frolic Music Friday

Music for the Fishbowl Frolic this Friday will be piped in by KWAX, according to an announcement by dance committee chairman Jackie Steuart. of doctor of science was conferred upon him in 1946 by Colorado college.

Service in two world wars has been part of Strieby's long and eventful career. In World War I he served in France as a captain of the Signal Corps. He received a presidential citation for his work in the Second World War as civilian communications consultant to the Secretary of War.

The YWCA sponsors a nursery school with a full time director. Women interested in working with three and four year olds are needed in this phase of the committee work.

In addition to these things the service committee of the YW provides Girl Scout and Y-teen leaders for the junior and senior high schools in Eugene. There is a special need just now for two women to be dance instructors at Woodrow Wilson junior high school on Nov. 12th and 19th from 12:45 to 1:45 p.m.

A new project this year is the West Moreland youth program. Tentative plans include a Friday night dance and a social program.

The sophomore members of the committee, under the auspices of the YW Sophomore Cabinet, are planning a charm school for junior high aged girls, to be held at local schools.

All women who are interested in any phases of the YW service committee are urged to attend the meeting this afternoon, Miss Anderson said.

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JOB OPPORTUNITIES

Lt. D. E. Wilson, naval aviation cadet program officer for the Northwest, and H. L. Fischer, aviation electrician chief, will visit the University of Oregon today, Thursday and Friday. Lieutenant Wilson and Chief Fischer will interview any young men interested in the navy's flight training program.

Navy flight training is open to any young man who is unmarried, 18 to 27 years of age, has at least two years of college, and is able to pass the standard navy flight physical and mental examinations.

Naval aviation cadets enter 18 months of training at Pensacola, Florida, "Annapolis of the Air." Upon completion of flight training they are commissioned as ensigns in the Naval Reserve or as second lieutenants in the Marine Corps Reserve with pay and allowances amounting to \$5400 per year. During the 18 months of flight training, naval cadets are paid \$109 monthly. After receiving his commission, the naval aviator serves two and one-half years with the operating forces.

Upon completion of his four years of duty as a naval cadet and a naval aviator he may return to his home area and join a Naval Air reserve squadron as a "Weekend Warrior" and fly one weekend each month and two weeks each summer at full pay and allowances.

Once a young man makes application to become a naval cadet he will be completely processed and enrolled in one week if he so desires. Tests are given to anyone desiring

to take them with no obligation on the applicant's part. Men who will graduate at the end of the present term may enroll in the Naval Cadet program now and report for flight training after graduation. Men who have taken their pre-induction physical examination but who have not received their induction notice may enroll in the Naval Aviation Cadet program.

Interviews with interested young men will be held in Emerald hall from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. on each of the three days.

Information in regard to other Naval Reserve programs leading to commissions will also be available.

The graduate placement service has received bulletins from the Navy and other government agencies, offering civilian positions to persons with writing ability in specialized fields. The positions are open to women as well as men, and deal mainly with writing and editing technical research reports.

Those having a background of science are especially needed, but there are also openings in the social sciences and english.

Two representatives from Montgomery Ward retail stores will be here next Tuesday to interview seniors for future jobs in store management.

A store management training program is offered, so these interviews are not limited to business administration majors. Appointments may be made by contacting the graduate placement service in Emerald hall.
