Iran Breaks Diplomatic Relations with Britain

Iran cut off diplomatic relations with Britain Thursday in a nationwide broadcast by Premier Mohammed Mossadegh.

With this action Mossadegh killed chances for the present to settle the 18 month old oil dispute. The U. S. State department still hoped for settlement between the two countries despite the diplomatic break.

Officials at the British Foreign office declared that the break with Iran has brought the bitter oil dispute to its most critical phase.

Russian Threat To West Voiced By Eisenhower

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower warned against a "cold peace" and "fake idealism" of U. S. communists at the annual Alfred E. Smith Memorial foundation dinner in New York Thursday night.

He declared that the only way to meet Soviet tactics is by unity and faith in the free world. He pictured European communists as enlisting the help of selfish nationalists and frightened advocates of neutrality.

"The Russian frontier has moved westward until it includes Berlin within its limits," he said.

Crew Battles Blaze In Mt. Hood Forest

Weary fire crews were battling Thursday night to control fires that have covered an estimated 1,400 acres of the Mt. Hood National Forest.

The latest outbreak was reported north of Brightwood, a small highway community about 6 miles from the earlier Zig-zag fires. The fire started on the north side of the Sandy river and covered 10 acres by early afternoon.

Moist air moving in from the ocean relieved the situation Thursday, but forecasters fear that weather conditions may become worse by Friday morning.

Chinese Commies Suffer Large Loss

Chinese Communists lost one fifth of their attacking forces in 11 charges during the night against Triangle Hill and Sniper Ridge in Central Korea.

The Communists are believed to have lost at least 3,000 men since they began their assaults on these strategic spots three days ago.

The U. S. Seventh division now holds all of Triangle Hill except Pike's Peak, a knob on the Northwest part of the hill. The Reds hold only one knob on Sniper Hill.

Rockets Fired From Balloons Up to 40 Miles

The navy announced Thursday that it has launched rockets from giant balloons to 40 mile altitudes literally above the top of the world.

The balloons loaded with scientific instruments were released by Coast Guard Icebreaker Eastwind in Baffin Bay, west of Northern Greenland. Each balloon was as tall as a ten-story building, and rockets suspended beneath the balloons were fired almost vertically after they had been lifted through most of the earth's surface.

The soaring rockets radioed back cosmic radiation measurements at the one point on the globe where the earth's magnetic field has the least influence on oncoming cosmic ray particles.

Amendment to ASUO Constitution

The ASUO Senate proposes to the Associated Students of the University of Oregon that:

Article VI, Section IV (Dates of Elections) be amended to change Freshman elections from after the first and prior to the fifth week of winter term, to after the fifth and prior to the eighth week of fall term except for the academic year 1952-1953 when the election shall be held after the fifth and prior to the tenth week of fall term.

- () YES, I vote to adopt the proposed amendment.
() NO, I vote against the adoption of the proposed amendment.

As provided in Article 2, Clause 9 of the ASUO constitution, the Emerald is publishing "the sample ballot and voting instructions . . . the two successive days prior to election".

The voting instructions, as listed by Helen Jackson Frye, ASUO vice-president and chairman of elections, are as follows:

1. Polling places will be located at:
 - a. East entrance of the library.
 - b. Front of the Co-op.
 - c. Front of Fenton hall on 13th.
 - d. Front of Student Union.
 - e. Carson hall
 - f. John Straub
2. Any student who presents his "Registration card" (student body card) and has his name on the poll book may vote.
3. One-third of the eligible voters must vote and two-thirds of those must mark the affirmative choice before the measure will pass.
4. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 22.
5. This is a non-partisan issue and endorsed by the ASUO senate.
6. If the measure passes, freshman elections will be held Nov. 14 of this year and before the eighth week of fall term hereafter unless changed again by constitutional amendment.
