UCLA, Stanford Collide in Stellar Coast Skirmish

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The rash of intersectional contests is nearly over. The Pacific Coast conference is getting ready to settle down to family football feuds. Only one major Midwest foe will be faced on Saturday—Ohio State, by the Washington State Cougars. Idaho faces North Dakota State. The rest of the bill is strictly western.

The game of the week will find the UCLA Bruins hosting the Stanford Indians. The game shapes up as a contest between an unusually strong UCLA defense and a potent Stanford offense. The way defense has been mushrooming as a key factor this season, it should be an interesting test. Russ Newland of the AP gives Stanford the edge, but only by a single point.

Washington is a similarly slight favorite to edge the Oregon Webfoots in another conference clash. Southern California is rated some 14 points stronger than Oregon State. The powerful California Bears are expected to have a field day against the injury-ridden Santa Clara Broncos.

Trojans Dig-in

The National Collegiate Athletic bureau points out that one of the big reasons for Southern California's unbeaten campaign so far is its rugged defensive play.

The latest statistics disclose that six of the 15 touchdowns the Trojans have scored this year have been turned in by the defensive platoon. That hard-knocking unit, has forced Southern Cal opponents to fumble 17 times. The Trojans have picked up ten of the fumbles.

Webfoots Sport Husky Appetite

The thin green line of Oregon Ducks departed last night for Seattle and Saturday's game with the University of Washington Huskies. With Stan Gottschalk, Manning Barber, and Tom Lyon out, Oregon can muster only 36 men for the traveling squad. Thirty-seven players are allowed.

Hal Dunham was elected game captain this week and will be called on for quarterbacking chores before his home state fans. Coach Len Casanova said that George Shaw will be called back into defensive service due to the shortage of players.

Although short in numbers, the Ducks will probably be "high" for the game as almost all of the starters were on hand for last year's Multnomah stadium fiasco. A large turnout of Oregon rooters watched all-American Hugh McElhenny and cohorts run up 63 points against the ne'er-do-well Ducks. This year, all concerned would be happy to see the Husky homecoming spoiled by an upset Oregon win.

OREGON vs. Washington at Seattle

Last year Washington was primarily a running team. This season, due to the return of Don "The Arm" Heinrich, and the departure of "Hurryin' Hugh" to the San Francisco 49ers, Washington is concentrating on its passing potential. Until last weekend and the beating given them by Northwestern, the passing had worked fairly well.

Husky Coach Howie Odell has switched his attack back to the running variety in honor of Oregon's weak ground defenses. Bill Albrecht, half, and Captain Dick Sprague, fullback, were moved into the defensive safety spots to handle Webfoot passes.

May Stay Out

Bill Earley, the other regular offensive starter, is a probable bench-warmer due to a torn ligament in the foot. Oregon defenders will then meet Jack Kyllingstad and Jack Nugent at the halves, with Frank Lariza at fullback.

Don Heinrich will also be around to keep the Oregon secondary honest with his pinpoint passing and big receivers. Left end George Black has been one of Heinrich's favorite targets this season and is second to Earley by one reception with a total of 16, for 225 yards.

Probable starters for Oregon will be Ted Anderson and Farrell Albright, halves, Tom Novikoff fullback and either Dunham or Shaw at quarterback. Monte Brethauer, the Coast's leading pass receiver will be ready as usual and should give fits to the Washington secondary. Ron Lyman should also be causing trouble for the opposition as he did against California. Lyman's sensational endzone catch last week kept Oregon in the game until the third quarter.

Pass Duel

What has been billed as a passing duel between Shaw and Hen-

rich could turn out to be a running contest as both teams have given up lots of rushing yardage in previous games. The fact that Albrecht and Sprague were switched to defense might cut down the Oregon passing game. Odell describes them as "the finest deep defensive men in the game."

Game time is 2 p.m. and a crowd of 40,000 is expected for Washington's Homecoming. The weather bureau predicts sunshine and temperatures in the low 60s—after the morning fog has cleared.

Hale Kane Slams SAE Seven, 6-0 For Mural Title

Hale Kane's destructive passing-catching duo, Tailback Joe Tom and End Mel Streeter, paced the Hawaiians to the intramural football crown Thursday afternoon, slipping past Sigma Alpha Epsilon, 6-0, in the final contest. The bare-footed Hale Kane crew, which also won the title last year as Minturn hall, scored a total of 174 points during the season against only two scored by the opposition.

After scoring on a 50-yard aerial drive midway through the second quarter, the winners put up an air-tight defense that kept the SAE's at least 50 yards from scoring territory throughout the game.

Hale Kane Scores

The touchdown thrust, which took only five plays, started when Tom gathered in an SAE pass on the midfield marker. After missing on an aerial to Streeter, Tom threw a flat pass that was good for a yard.

On third down, the diminutive tailback fired one to Streeter on the enemy 40. Gambling on fourth down, Tom again faded back to throw and connected with Bob Muirhead, who was finally tagged on the 8.

This set the stage for another pass to the lanky end, Streeter, who jumped high and pulled the ball down in the end zone. An attempted extra point aerial fell short of its receiver.

Tight Defense

Before and after this lone score, neither team could penetrate deeply into their opponent's territory.

The contest was highlighted by sparkling defensive play, as shown by seven pass interceptions. Line work was also of top caliber by both sevens. Perhaps the defensive standout was Gene Buckley, reserve SAE guard who couldn't be kept out of the Hale Kane backfield.

After two passes had been intercepted on the first three plays of the first half, the Hawaiian speedsters settled down and drove to a near first down on their own 41. The SAE line held, though, so Bob Fase kicked barefooted to the enemy 10.

Three scrimmages later Streeter pulled in a stray SAE toss on SAE's 20. Four downs failed to move the ball and Sigma Alpha Epsilon took over. The losers held the ball for only one try, however, as Tom intercepted the pass that set up the TD.

Before the half ended, SAE generated a drive that ended on the opponent 35, where time ran out.

SAEs Rally

After neither team had threatened paydirt in the third quarter, Sigma Alpha Epsilon almost got back into the game in the fourth. Rex Davis, 32 minute end for SAE, grabbed a Tom aerial on the 50 and almost got away.

Bob Brittain made 11 yards for the invaders on an end run and then completed a pass to Stan Savage to put the ball on Hale Kane's 25. Brittain's next try was incomplete and the one after that misfired into the hands of safety man Tom on the Hawaiian's 7.

Hale Kane picked up two more first downs before the game ended and as the timer blew his whistle, was crossing midfield into SAE property.

Altogether, Tom threw 30 aerals and completed 16. SAE's toss- (Please turn to page five)
