The Big Move

Defensive weaknesses have caused Washington no end of trouble and that is exactly the reason why Howie Odell has moved Dick Sprague, the 1950 all-American, and Bill Albrecht over into the secondary. The Huskies' pass defense was woe-ful against Illinois last week, so Odell, fearing the vaunted arms of George Shaw and Hal Dunham, went heavy on the neglected secondary as a safety measure.
