Morse Offered 'Gift' Position

(AP)—Oregon's Senator Wayne Morse has told The Oregonian in a telephone interview Monday that he was offered a high position in public life...

Morse said that on his return he will deliver a talk entitled: "Now it can be told." He said last week that he will vote for the Democratic presidential nominee, Governor Stevenson...

Morse declared during the interview: "The behind-the-scene representations made to me by the Eisenhower crowd convinced me they would stoop to anything to gain victory..."

Truman Hits GOP Group

(AP)—President Truman has issued a special statement Monday accusing the Republicans of deliberately twisting his words to make it sound that Dwight D. Eisenhower, the Republican presidential candidate, is against the Jews and Catholics.

"I said no such thing and indeed meant no such thing, and any fair person who reads what in fact I did say, must be shocked by the absurdities of the press of the last few days," declared Truman and added: "I know the Republican candidate is neither anti-Catholic nor anti-Jewish..."

"That is what I said last Friday and that is what I say today. The practices of those senators—the practices of the big lie and character assassination—are identified with the so called 'master race theory' and no amount of distortion can change the fact," said Truman further.

Lewis is Silent; Strike Continues

(AP)—The soft coal mine operators have appealed to John L. Lewis to tell his mine workers to go back to work, but no answer has been received this far.

The operators said that it was not their fault that they can't pay the \$1.90 raise negotiated in the last contract. The wage stabilization board has cut 40 cents off the increase.

Lewis has not said anything so far about the situation which led to a strike of more than 305,000 miners laying off work. There are reports that Lewis has summoned the policy committee of his union to a Washington meeting tomorrow.

'Angry' Ike Blasts Demos

(AP)—Dwight D. Eisenhower, the Republican presidential candidate, blasted angrily his opponents during his tour through the Northeast.

"I believe that corruption in government is not something to shrugged off. That is why this scandal-a-day administration stands before the country discredited," said Eisenhower.

He charged that the opposition is spreading lies and poison and cried: "I get to the point where I get too angry to speak. You speak for me on November 4."

He said also that he had been accused of being anti-Semitic and anti-Catholic, and continued: "Thank goodness I got such friends as Cardinal Spellman, Rabbi Silver, and Bernard Baruch to answer those lies in a hurry."

His running mate, Senator Nixon of California, denied in a speech Monday charges that Eisenhower is not master of his own campaign. "Stevenson is not running. Truman and Acheson are running Stevenson. They've got a ring in his nose," said the vice-presidential candidate earlier.

Kenya Rebels Against British

(AP)—A rebellion has broken out in the British East African colony Kenya and Britain is rushing troops to Nairobi, the capital of Kenya, where martial law has been declared.

Mau Mau, a secret native society, is pillaging and killing in a campaign to drive out the British. During the night the rebels burned the swanky white polo club in Nairobi.

The British, afraid of a repetition of what is happening in Malaya, landed 12 planes with troops in Nairobi and are sending the cruiser Kenya to the colony.

Adlai Attacks Eisenhower, Taft

(AP)—The Democratic standard bearer, Adlai Stevenson, told his audience in Springfield, Illinois, that Eisenhower is going around saying one thing, but that Senator Taft is assuring the country that Eisenhower really means something else.

"While the galaxy of political followers ride off in all directions with the General struggling mightily to keep from falling off the thrashing elephant, the expediency of it all is showing through—no policy, no program, and no real faith in the future in America," said Stevenson.
