Ducks Polish Running; Streeter Shows Well

In preparation for their home opener against the Grizzlies of Montana, Saturday afternoon the Webfoots ran through a long offensive scrimmage Tuesday. Backfield Coach John McKay was pleased with the running game, especially with the off-tackle slants of Merritt Barber, which went for long gains. During the course of the scrimmage, George Shaw, Hal Dunham, and Barney Holland alternated in the driver's seat of the Webfoot machine.

Streeter Shows Promise
Mel Streeter, in his second afternoon of football practice, showed promise at the offensive end position. He snagged two touchdown passes, one thrown by Shaw, the other by Holland.

Farrell Albright carried the ball only a few times in the long session. Albright, Ted Anderson, and Monte Brethauer missed most of the heavy work.

Linemen Shaken Up
Ron Pfeister, center, and tackle Chuck Laird were slightly shaken up during the practice.

At the last meeting of these two teams, the Ducks emerged victorious by a count of 20-13.

The Webfoots scrimmaged with the Frosh for the second consecutive day and more of the same is in store for them today as Coach Len Casanova sends his gridders after their second win of the season.

Both Montana and Oregon have records of one win, four losses. The Grizzlies dropped their most recent outing, 41-0 to the Colorado Aggies last weekend, while the Ducks were receipting for a 49-0 shutout.

Two players who gave the Webfoots considerable difficulty two years ago are still around—Bob Graves and Bob Yurko, a pair of speedsters. Montana operates from the standard T.

Mantle Takes New Physical

MIAMI, OKLAHOMA (AP)—The major league all-star center-fielder, Mickey Mantle of the World Champion New York Yankees, will undergo another Selective Service Physical Examination tomorrow. It will be the 20-year-old outfielder's third induction examination in two years.

Rejected Previously
Mantle was rejected before because of a bone disease caused by an old football injury. Even if Mantle passes his physical exam, it is considered unlikely that he will enter military service. He is the sole support of his mother, two brothers, and a sister. He also is married and about to become a father.

The star of the 1952 World Series will take the examination in Oklahoma City.

Site of Duck-OSC Tilt Switched to Ice Arena

PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon and Oregon State will play a pre-season basketball game at the Portland Ice Arena Dec. 1. The game earlier had been scheduled for the Pacific International Livestock Pavillion. The Air Force is currently seeking that building as a warehouse, so all basketball games scheduled there have been changed.

The Oregon-Seattle University game, also scheduled for the Livestock Pavillion, will be played in Eugene Dec. 20.

Charles Hopes To K.O. Brion

NEW YORK (AP)—Former heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles said today that he realizes he will have to shoot for knockouts in the future to gain another chance at boxing's biggest title.

Charles whirled through two fast rounds of sparring in preparation for his Friday scrap with Cesar Brion in New York's Madison Square Garden.

Charles said: "I will go after a knockout. I realize I have two strikes on me now due to the fact that I have lost twice to Jersey Joe Walcott. I do not intend to strike out."

His opponent of Friday night, Brion, worked out at Greenwood Lake, New York. He boxed four rounds which brought his total to 55 for the past two weeks, a very fast pace.

Bear Offense, Trojan Defense Collide in PCC 'Game of Week'

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The West Coast is coming up with the game of the week this Saturday. The offensively powerful California Bears versus the defensively mighty Southern California Trojans. Both teams are unbeaten and untied, and both teams rank high among the top ten grid teams of the nation.

The struggle has been shaping up all season, indeed, since a year ago, when the then still undefeated rivals collided at Berkeley and the Trojans won, 21-14. That was the game in which Cal's great full-back, Johnny Olszewski, was injured, and the California supporters accused the hard-hitting Trojans of unnecessary roughness. The aftermath of that game is still a sore spot for both teams.

Eugene May Get Tri-City Franchise

PASCO, WASHINGTON (AP)—The Tri-City Braves franchise of the Western International Baseball league may shift next year, possibly to Eugene, Oregon. Chairman Mike Cronin of the Tri-City Booster club says a community drive to get funds for the team fell far short of the 23,000-dollar goal. He estimated that only ten per cent of the desired amount was obtained.

The money was to be used to buy the club, which had been put up for sale at the end of the 1952 baseball season. General Manager Dick Richards says if the money isn't raised at Kennewick, Wash., he might go to Eugene or some other city. Cronin said his booster club hasn't yet given up hope of raising the money.

Eugene was without professional baseball during the 1952 season when the Far West (Class D) league suspended operations. The WIL is in Class A.

But again on deck is 216-pound Elmer Willhoite, a tremendous defensive guard. With him are such stout defenders as Bob Van Doren, Bob Hooks and Bill Hattig.

These and other Trojans have jelled into just about the stoutest grid defense in the nation. They've held five opposing teams to the meager total of 19 points. Trojan Coach Jess Hill is justly proud of his stalwart forward wall.

California's mentor, Pappy Waldorf, is well known as no slouch as a teacher of defense, but perhaps Pappy hasn't had to worry too much about defense, what with his Bears scoring 179 points against five opponents. And Olszewski isn't the entire show in the Berkeley attack. His backfield mates, Bill Powell and Don Johnson, rate 2-3 behind him in yards gained in the entire Pacific Coast Conference.

So that's it for Saturday, Southern California defense versus California offense, with the early odds favoring the Bears by a slim six-point margin.
