Tuition Provides Funds For University Services

Now you see it and now you don't! Ever get that impression when you come across with the great American dollar at the close of registration? Releasing your grip on that \$55 (or \$115 if you weren't smart enough to get born and brought up as a Webfoot) it disappears through the little window in the business office and out of your life forever. Or so it seems.

On the contrary, you never walk across campus without viewing the results of your personal investment and that of all the thousands of students who have attended the University. Over half, \$30, of every tuition payment automatically goes into a general maintenance fund which pays administration and instruction costs as well as the upkeep and improvement of the grounds and physical plant.

Yet this makes up a small percentage of the total \$4,000,000 necessary to run a business as large as the University for one year. Approximately 76 per cent of the total budget comes from the state general tax funds and 6 per cent from gifts, endowment income, federal grants and miscellaneous sales and service. Thus you are paying only 18 per cent of the actual cost of your education.

Funds Channeled

It is this payment which is revoked when a student receives a scholarship from the State System of Higher Education. Every student must pay a \$25 fee.

The remaining tuition funds are channeled into different areas of the auxiliary activities budget. This totals \$3,500,000 yearly and includes the budget of the Student Union, dormitories, athletic department and educational activities. No state funds go into this budget.

The health service, gym and athletic account for \$10.50 of the remaining \$25. The Student Union and educational activities such as concerts, lectures, and other imported entertainment eat up another \$4.50. This sum also includes financial support for the Emerald and KWAX. The publication of the Oregana is, however, self-support-

ing from subscription funds.

\$8 for Student Union

The remaining \$8 constitutes a building fee which is currently being used to retire a state general obligation bond issue on the Student Union building. No state funds were used in this project and the SU program is financed from student fees and receipts taken in from food service, bowling and other activities there. The two-year old building was financed entirely from gifts, student fees and the bond issue.

Every cent paid in as room and board in University owned housing is also used to improve student living. Currently \$30,000 above the actual cost of living expenses is being paid yearly to retire a state general obligation bond of \$1,600,000 on Carson hall. When payment is completed on this bond, plans to construct additional excess funds to construct a new men's dorm will get under way. No state funds are used in this project of supplying campus housing for students.

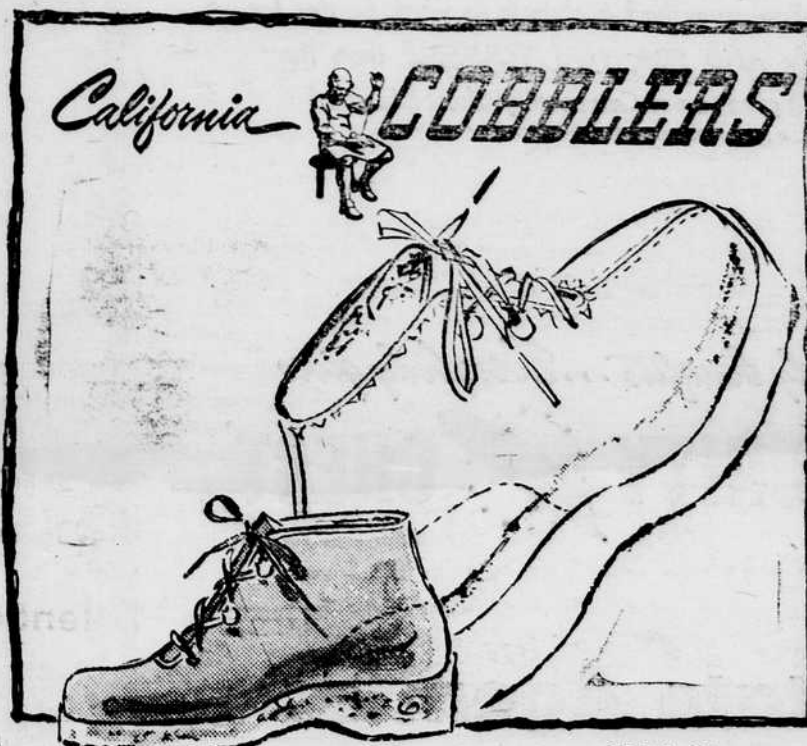
