Korean Question Now Top Priority

(P)—The United Nations political committee is set to begin debate Thursday on the Korean question.

The committee voted to give Korea immediate top priority after wrangling more than three hours. The United States, Britain and France teamed up in demanding immediate debate on the Korean issue alone. Russia wanted immediate debate on a Polish plan for settling the Korean conflict on Communist terms but this was beaten down.

As a result, Secretary of State Acheson is ready to give the UN political committee a detailed report Thursday on the deadlocked Korean truce talks.

He is expected to propose asking the UN assembly to endorse the Allied stand in the negotiations—and to urge the Communists to accept a Korean armistice on UN terms.

Truman Storms Through Penn

(P)—Barnstorming through Pennsylvania today, President Truman painted a black picture of what he called slavery for the working man and up to 28 million unemployed in a new depression if the GOP won the election.

Truman said that Dwight D. Eisenhower has shown himself so subject to political pressure that, if elected—as the president worded it — Eisenhower could plunge us into another depression or, even worse, might get us into a third world war.

Truman's campaigning Wednesday took him from the hard coal mines in eastern Pennsylvania to the steel mills of Pittsburgh—where he will deliver a major speech Wednesday night.

The crowds were big at Truman's railway station whistle-stops. There were some boos and some heckling, too, at Northumberland. This railroad junction is normally Republican territory northwest of Harrisburg.

Truman says Eisenhower is willing to make politics out of the Korean casualty lists. And the President adds—"I cannot trust a man who has played this kind of game with the grave issues of our national security."

Ike Supported By Democrat

(P)—In New York, the Democratic candidate for president in 1924 has come out for Dwight D. Eisenhower.

John W. Davis says he will support Eisenhower because of what Davis terms widespread corruption in government. He said the situation demands a change in party control.

Davis served as ambassador to Great Britain from 1918 to 1921, was president of the American bar association in 1922, and was the Democratic presidential nominee in 1924.

In his statement, Davis said—"The proven facts of widespread corruption, or carelessness, complacency and favoritism in government circles demand a change in party control."

Davis said Eisenhower's career gives proof that he can bear great responsibility; that he does not shrink from making important decisions; and that he possesses such tact in dealing with other men that he can draw together discordant groups in the pursuit of a common end.

Lie Fires UN Worker

(P) — U.N. Secretary General Trygve Lie Wednesday fired one American U.N. employee who refused to answer questions of a senate inquiry group. Lie suspended another American U.N. employee for the same reason, and put ten on special leave pending further investigation.

The one who has been fired—Stanley Graze—was with the U.N. technical assistance administration. He refused to tell senate investigators whether he is presently engaged in spy activities against the United States.

The suspended employee—Joel Gordon—was with the department of economic affairs. He refused to tell whether he was now engaged in any subversive activities against the U.S. government.

Rep Candidate Attacks Demos

(P) — Dwight D. Eisenhower, campaigning in New England, has criticized the administration for saying that a Republican victory would lead to a business depression.

In a talk in Hartford, Connecticut, the Republican nominee called these charges a "campaign of fear" and promised to make sure that the workers not only have more take-home pay—but that the pay they take home will have greater buying power than it has now.

Eisenhower will make a nationwide radio broadcast Wednesday night from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, New York.

In his Troy speech Eisenhower says the Truman administration adopted a policy of inflation in order to win the election by making the people think they had made money, although it was worth less.

Declares Eisenhower—"The inflation we suffer is not an accident. It is a policy."

Move Started To Jail Reds

(P)—Attorney General Thomas McGranery has begun action to jail eight Communist leaders while deportation cases against them are pending.

McGranery said the move to put them behind bars is based on their current activity in Communist affairs. The Attorney General also wants to deport or de-naturalize ten more top Reds.

At the same time, the Attorney General ordered a new check on the health of William Z. Foster, Communist party secretary. Foster's plea of poor health put off action on a charge of conspiracy to advocate the overthrow of the government by force. Eleven other top Reds indicted with Foster were convicted on that charge.

Globe Enlightens Airport Officials; Guarantee Good

(P)—A 25 watt light bulb was found after it had been buried 10 years under 18 inches of rock and asphalt at the Yakima, Wash., airport.

The bulb was once part of a marker system. The airport manager said the bulb, encased in a glass protector, apparently was covered during war-time construction work. It was uncovered during recent improvements.

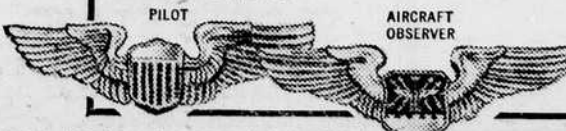
