Heinrich Paces Passers; Monte Tops Receivers

LOS ANGELES (AP) — By land and by air, Johnny Olszewski of California and Don Heinrich of Washington are running away with offensive honors in the Pacific Coast Conference, according to statistics released today from the PCC Commissioner's office.

Olszewski has smashed 536 yards in five games from his fullback post at an average of 6.6 yards per carry. Heinrich, a T-quarterback, has 72 pass completions in 141 throws good for 919 yards and seven touchdowns. He also leads in total offense with 916 yards, having lost three rushing, with Olszewski second with 536 yards. Bob Garrett of Stanford, the No. 2 passer, is third in total offense, while Olszewski's teammates, Bill Powell and Don Johnson, rank second and third in rushing.

Monte Brethauer, Oregon end, is the PCC's top receiver and one of

These Hefty Gridders Form Bulwark of Offensive Montana Line

Cas Stresses Defense During Closed Session

Oregon's Webfoots, in a session behind closed gates Wednesday afternoon, prepared for their coming clash with the Montana University Grizzlies at Hayward field, Saturday afternoon.

Emphasis in the two hour drill period was placed on fundamentals. Linemen spent an hour brushing up on defensive work, while the backs and ends took part in passing drills. Dunham and Shaw hit their receivers with regularity and both looked in top form for Saturday's encounter. Mel Streeter, in only his third day of practice, looked good on the receiving end of passes. Mel, who lettered three years in Oregon basketball, is out for his first try at college football.

Spirit High

The Ducks worked on their ground game which hasn't been too potent up to now. With the defensive using the Montana style, the offensive ran smoothly, and everyone showed lots of spirit and hustle.

Highlighting the practice was a scrimmage against the Freshman crew. The varsity played only on defense. Filling in at Emery Barnes' end position was Don Hedgepeth, regular offensive tackle. Barnes will be out of action Saturday with a back injury. Others also expected to be on the sidelines for the game are Ted Anderson, Monte Brethauer, and Manning Barber. The defensive platoon will be strengthened by the return of Chuck Laird to his linebackers position. He has missed the past two games.

Offensively, the Webfoots will again rely on their passing attack. With the ground game having gar-

nered only 424 yards in five games, it will be up to the right arms of Shaw and Dunham to bring the gridders their second triumph of the season. Shaw has completed 35 of 76 passes in five games, a .460 average, while Dunham sports a .396 mark with 23 completions in 58 tries. On the ground Dean Van Leuven leads the attack with 10.1 yards per try with 12 carries. Tom Novikoff has a 3.5 average in 56 plays, making him the workhorse.

Montana Line Strong

Montana's invading forces have run up a total of 926 yards in five games, 737 yards having been gained on the ground. Heading the Grizzlie attack are Bob Dantic, fullback, with 5.4 yards per carry and Dean Brote and Gene Carlson, with five and four yards per try respectively. Bolstering the forward wall are Joe Delucca, and Bob Amtonick, guards, and Gordon Jones, tackle.

During the past the Oregon and Montana have met five times with the Ducks having captured five consecutive wins. They will go out this Saturday with hopes of adding another win to that strong.

Idaho-Duck Tilt OKed by Official

MOSCOW (AP) — Pacific Coast Conference Commissioner Victor Schmidt saw movies of the Oregon-Idaho football game today at Moscow, Idaho. He said he found nothing wrong with the officiating.

Schmidt said he agreed with the statement made Saturday by the conference supervisor of officials, Frank McCormick. McCormick termed the controversial calls made during a crucial period of the game matters of judgment.

Schmidt said there was no evidence of any mistakes made by officials in the applications of rules. Idaho fans had complained about the officiating when Oregon—trailing most of the way—scored two touchdowns to win the game in the last four minutes. Idaho's student newspaper said the game should be called no contest, and school officials asked conference officials to see movies of the game.

PORTLAND (AP)—Grant High of Portland — one of Oregon's top football powers, will have to forfeit 4 of its 5 grid victories because one of its players was ineligible.

Portland school authorities informed Grant officials of the forfeits today. The ineligible player was Hank Bentz, a reserve end, who resides less than one block out of the Grant district. A player must live in his school's district in order to compete in athletic contests. Bentz had played in 4 league games and these must be forfeited.

Grant was leading the Portland league race and was figured as a cinch to win a state play-off berth. This week's Associated Press poll rated Grant as number-4 in the state.
