

Duck Tracks

Not a drop of precipitation has fallen at an Oregon game for seven years and Coach Len Casanova is in no mood to have the spell broken Saturday afternoon.

"You wouldn't have the weekend weather report, would you?" Cas wondered out loud. Then he hastened to explain that the Montana State university Grizzlies, who open the home season here in two days, have a punter who could conceivably put the Ducks in a difficult position—say their own four or five yard lines.

Line Coach Vern Sterling, the Webfoots' number one seeing-eye, detective or what have you, scouted the Montana-Colorado A&M game at Fort Collins, Colo., Saturday and brought back reports of a six-foot, two-inch, 170 pound half-back who punts a football for an average of 42.4 yards per try.

Grizzly With a Big Foot

The phenom who drew mention from Casanova and Sterling is Hal Bellis. Should the field be slow and wet, Mr. Bellis might well be the determining factor. "He booted one from the Montana 10 to the Aggie 20. That's a fair-sized kick, considering that it traveled a full 70 yards in the air," said the impressed Sterling. "If it weren't for Bellis, no telling what the score might have been." The Aggies whaled Montana 41-0.

Strange thing about Bellis is that this is his first year of collegiate football—and he is a senior. Although he is listed as a back on the Grizzly roster, he is saved almost exclusively for his specialty.

Sterling had a devilish time before he was able to come up with any more figures on the Montana club. It's pretty hard to single out anyone who merits special praise in a losing effort such as 41-0. Undoubtedly the Montana scout at Seattle last week had little to write home about and maybe that's just as well. The job of scouting what Nebraska did on the Webfoots' opener in Los Angeles was accurate—too much so.

"They have a fine end and captain in Harold Maus," reported Sterling. "The Ags didn't run his end often." Maus is a six-foot four-inch, 200 pounder who plays both ways, but is more valuable on the defensive platoon.

Aggies Buffaloed Bears

Colorado A&M gained a large per cent of its yardage on short tosses, indicating that Montana's pass defense isn't up to snuff. But Washington's wasn't supposed to be either, and they intercepted nine Duck aerials. The Aggies run from the famed "I" formation, invented by Frank Lahey a few years back at Notre Dame. "They used a lot of double-hand-offs and both the quarterback and halfback did quite a bit of throwing against Montana," Sterling said.

You'll have to go a long way to better the record of Backfield Coach John McKay of the Webfoots who coolly and calmly collected 10 for 10 in Friday's Emerald football forecasts. It is the first time this season for an expert to make such a clean sweep.

Now we'll shoot the works this week—with four upsets of all sizes. Here goes:

Oregon 32, Montana 7 . . . this is the Webfoots' big chance to mop up. The Duck coaching staff was mighty displeased with the showing at Seattle and if the Oregons react as they should, they'll wax the weak Grizzlies.

Washington State 27, Oregon State 14 . . . How long is this Cougar outfit gonig to sustain the suspense? They've got to get going sometime.

Bruins Over Badgers

UCLA 16, Wisconsin 7 . . . The Bruins have a miserable record against teams from the Mid-west but this is their year to make hay. The Badgers are back in the favorite's role for the Big Ten championship and a trip to Pasadena, so it'll be close.

San Diego Navy 28, College of the Pacific 13 . . . The sailors have too many guns for the Tigers.

Michigan State 35, Penn State 7 . . . Biggie Munn's top-ranking Spartans should take this one from the Nittany Lions in stride.

Michigan 20, Minnesota 14 . . . The Gophers downed Illinois but the Wolverines are on their way up—Michigan to retain the little Brown Jug.

Now the upsets—first the little ones . . . Virginia 28, Duke 21 . . . The Cavaliers will outdo the Blue Devils in the Southeast's battle of the undefeated.

Southern Cal 17, California 14 . . . El Troy by the margin of a Tsagalakis field goal. But Cal will be mad over last year's Canamella-Olszewski incident.

Washington 28, Stanford 20 . . . Maybe it's because we haven't seen Stanford and have seen Heinrich and Albrecht and company.

Idaho 21, Santa Clara 20 . . . the Broncos are through the worst of their schedule. They should win but they'll expect a soft touch in the Vandals—and they won't get one.

the top seven in the nation, having caught 21 for 250 yards. Two Washington men have 18 each, Bill Earley and George Black. Des Koch, Southern California, has regained the lead in punting with a 43.9 yard average to 43.7 for Sam Baker of Oregon State, while another Trojan, Jim Sears, dominates the punt return department with 348 yards on 17 returns. Two have gone for touchdowns. Jay Buhler of Idaho leads in kickoff returns with 288 yards on 10 runbacks and an average of 28.8.

Milt Davis, UCLA, has six pass interceptions, one more than Jim Psaltis of Southern California, who has returned two for touchdowns. Olszewski is the leading scorer with 42 points on seven touchdowns, followed by Powell, 36 points, and Buhler, 31.

Three Conference games are scheduled Saturday: California-Southern California at Los Angeles; Washington-Stanford at Stanford, and Oregon State-Washington State at Pullman. UCLA plays at Wisconsin, Oregon hosts Montana and, in a Friday night game, Idaho plays Santa Clara in San Francisco.

Washington Back Nets Most Yards

Statistics released today by the NCAA service bureau display Don Heinrich as the national leader in yards gained passing and in total offense. In five games, the Huskies' quarterback has completed 72 out of 141 tosses for 919 yards and a completion average of better than 51 per cent. His total offense figure is 916 because Don has lost three yards as a runner.

Runnerup to Heinrich in total offense is Lynn Aplanalp of San Jose, who has run and passed for a total of 876 yards. Mitch Price of Columbia is third with 871.

Gene Filipski of Villanova—former Army player—is the leading runner with 592 total yards. Olszewski of California is second with 536 yards and Don Beasley of Arizona is third with 500.

Catlin AP Star

A co-captain of the Oklahoma Sooners, 20-year-old Tom Catlin, has been named lineman of the week in this week's Associated Press Poll.

Catlin, an All-America choice last year, was cited for a play that coach Bud Wilkinson called the turning point in Oklahoma's victory over Kansas last Saturday. Although Oklahoma won 42-20, the Sooners led by only 21-20 late in the third quarter.

Kansas was on Oklahoma's five-yard line with two downs to go for a touchdown. Catlin broke through to throw Kansas quarterback Jerry Robertson for a five-yard loss and Kansas lost the ball on downs on the next play.

Indians Polish Offense

Getting back to Heinrich, the Huskies play Stanford Saturday. And Indian coach Chuck Taylor is trying to polish an offense to offset Heinrich's passing. As the Stanford mentor puts it—"We need touchdowns and we hope to get them early . . . a passer like Heinrich is bound to hit a few—so our job is to outscore the Huskies."

UCLA coach Red Sanders merely shrugged his shoulders when told that his team is a 7-point underdog to Wisconsin at Madison this week. Sanders said he seldom pays much attention to such matters. His team emerged in fair condition from its win over Stanford last week. Halfbacks Paul Cameron and Ted Narleski . . . UCLA's alternate tailbacks . . . are still questionable performers. Sanders indicates he won't know until late this week whether either or both will be ready for full time duty against Wisconsin.

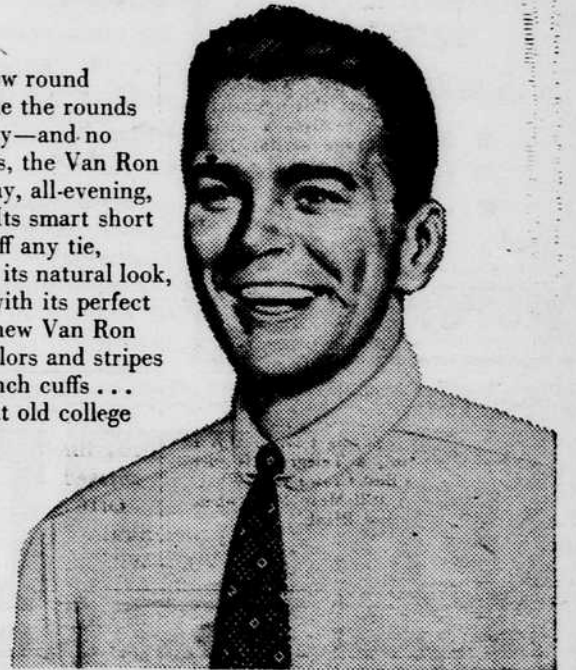


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
