Joint screening committee of the Student Union board and the ASUO recommended two persons for positions on the SU Board Wednesday. Their names will be sent to University President Harry K. Newburn for approval.

The two recommended are Robert Kully from the graduate school and James Livesay from the school of health and physical education.

(P)—Oregon highway commissioners said Tuesday that passenger car owners will have to pay nine million dollars more in increased license fees and gasoline tax bills if one constitutional amendment is passed Nov. 4th. The amendment is one which provides flat-rate fees for vehicles. They said the amendment would cost the state seventeen million dollars in construction funds, plus eight-million dollars in federal matching funds.

Sunday Organ Recital No Admission' Affair

Donald W. Allton, assistant professor of organ and music theory, will play an organ recital, Nov. 2 at 4 p.m. in the music auditorium. There is no admission charge for the concert. He will be presented by the American Guild of Organists in a concert open to both students and townspeople.

A member of the University staff since 1944, Allton has become well-known in the area for his work with choral groups and for his organ concerts. He is director of the University Singers and is in charge of choral activities in the music school.

At the age of fifteen he became organist and choir director of the First Congregational church at Biddeford, Maine. Later he became assistant organist for St. Luke's Cathedral in Portland, Maine.

Allton received both his bachelor's and master's degree from the Eastman School of Music at the University of Rochester. Upon graduation he went to the University of Kentucky as an instructor in music theory and director of choral groups. Two years before coming to Oregon he was acting head of the Mary Baldwin college music department.

The most recent of his concert appearances in the Northwest was in Portland where he dedicated the new organ at Augustana Lutheran church.
