Killer Typhoon Heads For Indo-China Coast

(CP)—A typhoon which has killed 370 people and destroyed two Philippine cities was heading for Indo-China Thursday.

Experts expect the typhoon to smash close to the Indo-China coast. Earlier in the week 500 were killed in the seaport city of Phan Thiet when a great wall of water smashed into the town.

A second typhoon is prowling now in Eastern waters and an alert has been posted at Guam. The storm, which is now 350 miles off the coast of Cuba, is expected to strike both Cuba and Florida.

Newsmen Say Adlai Gaining

(CP)—Oregon's six electoral votes still look safe for Dwight D. Eisenhower, but newspaper and radio editors who took part in a new Associated Press survey think Governor Adlai Stevenson is gaining strength.

The 30 editors who made the survey in 24 of Oregon's 36 counties predicted that the Republican presidential candidate will get an even larger vote than was indicated in the AP survey six weeks ago.

They found that the larger proportion of undecided voters are apparently going to Eisenhower, but the picture may change, they believed. There are still some 15 to 20 per cent of the voters who are still undecided who could swing the election.

Ike Hits Truman Hate Injection

(CP)—Dwight D. Eisenhower, Republican presidential nominee, accused the Truman administration of injecting bigotry and class hatred into the presidential campaign.

Eisenhower asserted in a speech at Buffalo Thursday that the "power mad voices of the rabble rousers" year after year have tried to make political profit by setting group against group, special interest against special interest and section against section.

"We hear shrill voices today creating distrust, disunity and bigotry by falsely accusing others, including myself, of these evil things," said Eisenhower. In this he apparently referred to Truman's accusation that he had identified himself with "master race" principles.
