Lame Ducklings Await OSC Clash

Freshman Coach Bill Bowerman nursed his bandaged frosh football squad through practice with the varsity, Thursday afternoon, hoping to have his gridders back in good physical shape before meeting the OSC Rooks at Corvallis November 7.

With half his starting backfield and a good share of his linemen out with bumps and bruises, Bowerman had good reason to say Thursday that his team was "pretty beat up".

Larry Rose, plunging fullback from Reedsport, and Dick Pavlat left halfback sensation from Astoria, the two leading ground gainers on the Duckling eleven, saw very limited action in practice. Rose was out with a charley horse; Pavlat with a broken hand received in scrimmage.

On the line, Doyle Higdon, right end, George Mutchler, right guard; and Ted Overton, left end, drilled lightly. Higdon and Mutchler picked up their bruises in last weekend's Humboldt State clash.

Oregon's next opponents Oregon State Rooks, have not fared well in their first two games. They dropped, 13 to 0, to the Junior Varsity from Pacific university.

This weekend, OSC will try to break into the scoring column and also the winning column when they test the Washington U. Cubs in Corvallis.

OSC Crowd Hayward Record

Hayward field home of the Ducks, was filled to capacity in 1949 when 22,561 fans turned out for the Oregon-Oregon State game. The gross gate receipts were \$65,000, also the largest in Hayward history.

Biggest crowd ever to watch Oregon was in 1948 at Ann Arbor, Mich. when Norm Van Brocklin at-

tracted 66,642 paying customers. Michigan won that one, 14-0. Oregon's take home pay was \$63,113. Record Oregon receipt was \$107,834 at the Cotton Bowl game in Dallas, Jan. 1, 1949.

Casanova Worried About Weather; Brethauer, Barnes on Injured List

Leaden skies, intermittent showers and a muddy turf are in prospect for the University of Oregon's home opener against the Montana State university Grizzlies Saturday at 1:30 p.m. on Hayward field.

"A wet field will definitely aid Montana," Casanova warned.

If the rains come, it will be the first time in seven years for what, in grid circles, is known as the "great equalizer."

First Invasion

This is the Golden Grizzlies first Oregon Invasion since they banished themselves from the Pacific Coast conference in July, 1951. And they are expected to do no better as representatives of the Skyline Sight than their PCC predecessors. The Oregonians are favored in most corners by at least two touchdowns.

"We are not in very good shape—our injury list has increased since the Washington game," said Casanova, a bit downcast. Emery Barnes, giant defense end, and the Webfoots' top offensive threat, Monte Brethauer, are almost certain to sit this one out.

Wayne Johnson will take over both offensively and defensively against the Grizzlies, who have a one-win, wour-loss record, a la Oregon. Don Hedgepeth, a tackle, will be shifted back to the flank position to take up the slack left by Brethauer and Barnes.

Two Doubtful

Ted Anderson and Chuck Laird, offensive left half and line backer respectively, should see action. Both have been on the doubtful list.

If Anderson is available he will start along with George Shaw, quarterback, Cece Hodges, right half, and Tom Novikoff, fullback. Should Anderson not be ready, Lloyd Powell will be called upon

for offensive duties. Farrell Albright, regular righthalf, has been dropped into the second string, because of his lack-luster showing last week at Seattle.

Montana Rebuilding

The Grizzlies, long a door mat in the coast league, have had little success in the Skyline Eight, otherwise known as the Mountain States conference. Last year the visitors won twice, lost seven times and finished in the basement.

Eddie Chinske replaced Ted Shipkey at the helm of the Missoula gridders last spring. Chinske came up through the ranks—playing football for the Grizzlies for three seasons, 1926, 1927 and 1928. He became assistant coach in 1946 after 16 years of high school coaching.

In the Line

Montana's strength is supposed to lie in the line, but it has been none too formidable this year. Fourteen returning veterans, enough for two platoons, give the Grizzlies numerical depth. Heading
