Phil Sanders, junior in speech, is cast as Grandpere; Carl Winklebleck, senior in music; Shirley Pettijohn, junior in speech, Felice; Louise Smith, sophomore in business, Sally; Alan Barzman, senior in speech, Alfred; and Don Brown, graduate in English, Mr. Frye.
