

Gulda To Begin Series at Mac Court

Friedrich Gulda, 22-year-old Viennese pianist who will open the Civic Music Association series here this year, will perform at 8 p.m. tonight at McArthur Court. Student body cards will admit all students.

Five works are scheduled for the program, including Franz Josef Haydn's "Sonata in E flat minor," Ludwig von Beethoven's "Sonata in C minor, Opus 111," Serge Prokofieff's "Sonata No. 7, Opus 83," and Claude Debussy's "Reflets dans l'Eau" and "Feux d'artifice."

A student of Professor B. Seidhofer of the State Academy of Music in Vienna for eight years after a beginning study of five years, Gulda, at 16, won first prize at Geneva's International Competition of Music and later made his first public appearance with the Orchestre de la Suisse Romande un-

Absentee Ballots Due Wednesday

Wednesday is the deadline for all absentee voter ballots. This means that all the absentee ballots must have been notarized and be in the student's respective county clerk's office by Oct. 29. Notary publics in the Co-op and Emerald hall will be able to fill in the required signature for the voters.

Each voter is cautioned to know whether or not his state requires that the whole ballot be filled in while a notary is present, or if the ballot may be brought in sealed. Oregon ballots, for example, can be brought in sealed, but Washington, Idaho and Montana ballots should be marked in the presence of a notary public.

McCarthy Links Reds and Adlai

(P)—Sen. Joe McCarthy, Republican senator from Wisconsin, charged Monday in a nationwide radio and television broadcast that the Daily Worker, Communist newspaper, in effect has given complete endorsement to Democratic presidential candidate Adlai Stevenson.

McCarthy also attacked Stevenson associates as being left-wing sympathizers. One of the men, former Librarian of Congress Archibald MacLeish, said:

"McCarthy attacks me now, a few days after my country-wide appeal for funds to fight McCarthyism. The pattern is clear, and so is the implied threat to all others who criticize the Wisconsin senator."

'Free Americans,' Not Reds

Another, New York Post Editor James Wechsler, charged that McCarthy's real targets are not Communists, but free Americans who disagree with the senator.

Sparkman's Talk Changed to 3 p.m.

John Sparkman, Democratic candidate for vice-president of the United States, will give his campus address at 3 p.m. today in the Student Union ballroom instead of 1 p.m. as originally planned. Tsung-lien Shen, former Chinese commissioner for Tibet, will present his film-lecture at 1 p.m. in the SU ballroom.

The time change was made necessary by weather conditions which forced a delay in the arrival of Sparkman's plane at the Eugene airport. Shen was formerly to have talked at 4 p.m.

Official for Tibet To Show Movie On Life in Tibet

Tsung-lien Shen, former Chinese commissioner for Tibet, will deliver a film-lecture entitled "The Life and Activities of the Tibetan People" today at 1 p.m. in the Student Union ballroom.

For three years Shen was a resident of Tibet and had access through his official position to many intimate phases of Tibetan life. The technicolor film which will be presented on the campus today depicts many of these little known aspects of life in the hidden land.

Included in the film are such events as a fashion show by Tibetan belles, a wedding procession through the streets of Lhasa, an opera performance at the Dalai Lama's summer palace and an archery contest conducted on horseback. Parts of the film are every day scenes from Tibet as well as secret religious festivals never before filmed.

Marriage Customs Differ

Shen will describe in his lecture how the Tibetans live on the barren roof of the world. He will reveal how the successor of the priest-king of Tibet is chosen and tell of the unusual family unit of Tibet where one woman can marry several men.

A graduate of Harvard university, Shen has been a student of history and economics both in this country and in France where he worked as a research fellow at the University of Paris from 1925 to 1927. Returning to China, he taught at several universities and was an economic consultant to several industrial concerns. In 1935 he became a professor of history at
