CORVALLIS (AP)—Oregon State will face tough opposition when they meet the revitalized Washington Huskies in a coast conference football game at Portland next Saturday. The Huskies got off to a slow start this season. But the passing wizardry of all-American Quarterback Don Heinrich the past couple of week-ends has brought Washington back into the conference limelight. First Heinrich led the Huskies on a 49 to 0 romp over Oregon, then last week-end Washington upset Stanford, 27 to 14.

Montana Ties Ducks, 14-14 With Last-Quarter Surge

A bargain basement outfit from the mile-high Mountain States conference, the Montana State university Grizzlies, tagged the University of Oregon Webfoots with a humiliating, 14-14 standoff Saturday afternoon on murky Hayward field.

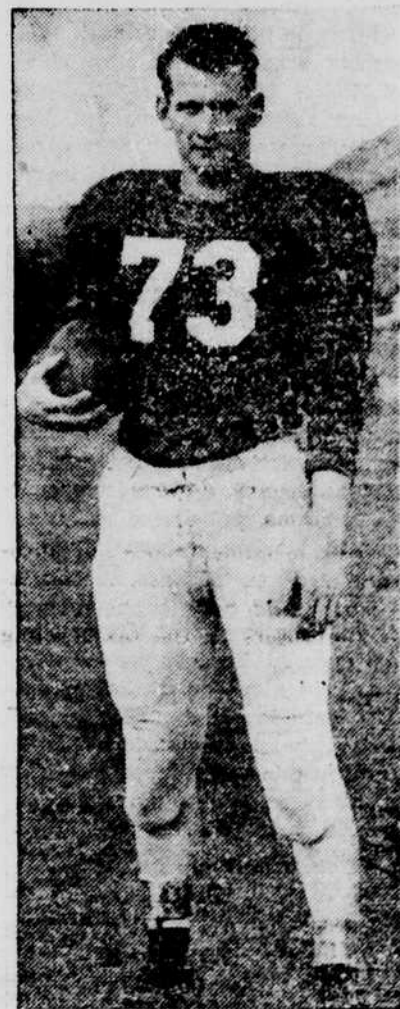
Coach Len Casanova's Ducks nursed a narrow 14-7 lead into the waning moments of the fourth quarter when—swoosh—the roof collapsed. The Oregons, groping for a possible third score and the clincher, literally threw away their chances when a pass was intercepted by Milt Wikert, 200 pound linebacker from Santa Ana, Calif. with 3:50 left in the game.

Grizzly Tutor Ed Chinske, at this point, inserted Dick Heath, a sophomore quarterback, to replace first-stringer Murdo Campbell who had trouble targeting his receivers. On first down 10 from the Oregon

23 Heath was swarmed over for a 12 yard loss. But Heath lofted a spiral to halfback Dean Brott, who gathered it in on the ten, and galloped across the double-chalk mark for the score. Right end Don Gerlinger added the tying tally from

placement.

The Webfoots won the battle of statistics hands down, with a combined passing and rushing total of 302 yards, compared to Montana's 147. Oregon registered 17 first downs, Montana, 10.

No bargain basement backs

Injuries, which have doggedly ridden Casanova's teams, continued to plague the Ducks. With Tom Elliot and Pat O'Brien already decommissioned for the season, the Oregons suffered another loss—that of Don Sloan, the kickoff and punt-run-back specialist. Sloan, a senior from Portland, was hospitalized with a compound leg fracture, after taking the opening kickoff.

Late in the quarter Bo Laird recovered one of Ted Anderson's fumbles on the Oregon 36. Campbell, Bill Gue, a hard-hitting back, and Brott negotiated a first down on the 25 but an offside penalty and a clipping assessment set the Grizzlies back to the 43. Hal Bellis finally booted out of bounds on the Webfoot two.

Ducks Rally

At the outset of the second quarter, with the game scoreless, Novikoff punted to the Duck 27 from the one. Gue and Laird rattled the vulnerable Oregon middle for consistent gains and Laird carted it over from the two.

What would have been the outcome had not the Ducks put on a stirring last minute rally in the first half is a horrendous thought Bellis booted to Bob Leter who returned it to the Montana 48 with 19 seconds left on the scoreboard.

General Shaw tossed incomplete to Wayne Johnson and then uncorked one to Anderson on the seven where interference was called on Dick Lindsay. Only a second remained and the injured Monte Brethauer was ushered in for one play. And play it he did—breaking to his left he veered sharply, faking out the entire Montana secondary and nonchalantly took Shaw's pass in the center of the endzone. Emerson Harvey converted.

Early in the second half Gue fumbled and Hodges recovered for Oregon on the Webfoot 40. Four first downs carried the Ducks to the Montana 24. Novikoff tried the middle and was stopped cold; Shaw threw to Anderson, incomplete; Anderson tried right end and lost two; but Shaw fired to Farrell Albright for an easy touchdown with 5:23 remaining in the third quarter. Harvey again added the extra point.

Oregon Loses Ball

It looked like the beginnings of a rout when Fullback Bob Dantic fumbled on the Montana 24 moments later. Dean Van Lueven slammed to the 20 and Albright picked up six to the 14 but a clipping penalty shelved the threat.

After the Grizzlies had knotted matters the Ducks tried to get back into the lead. On third down and 10 from the Oregon 30 Shaw passed to Novikoff for seven yards and then fired to Hodges who had a first down on the 44 but reversed his field to avoid a tackler and wound up with a two yard gain.

Montana took over again and, with two seconds to go, Gerlinger tried an odd-angle field goal from the 34. The kick wasn't close—wide and low to the right.

Nestor, Theta Chi, Counselors Win In Monday Mural Volleyball

Nestor Hall spanked French Hall, taking the first two games and the series by 15-5 and 15-12 tallies in intra-mural volleyball action Monday. 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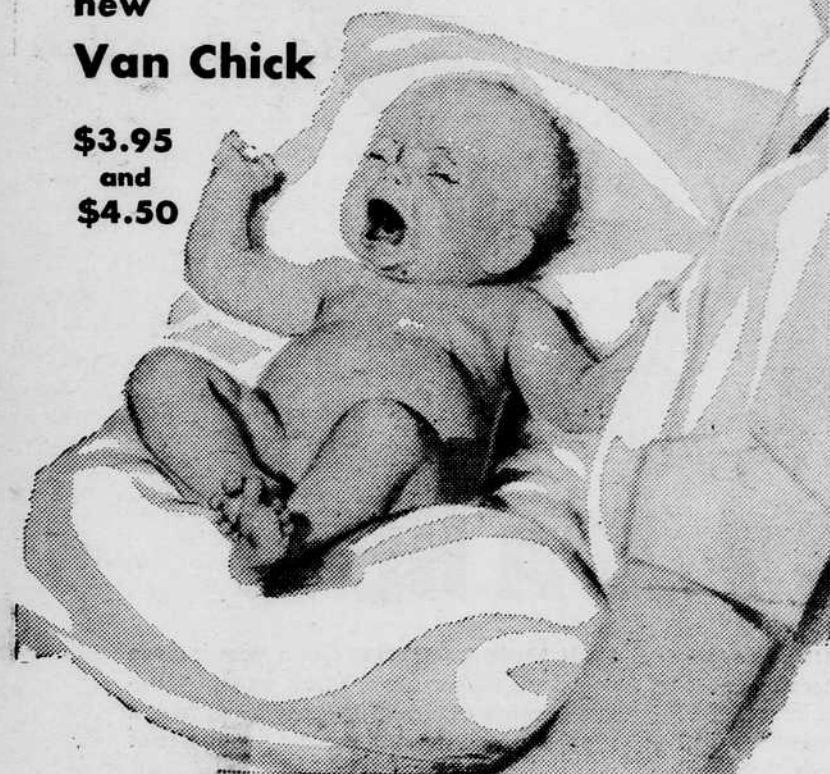
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
