the University of Paris.

During the war with Japan Shen withdrew to the interior of China where he joined the nationalist government at Chungking. Since that time he has held many positions of importance in the Chinese government and in the business world. From 1944 until 1947 Shen was resident commissioner to Tibet.

Shen's widespread travels have carried him to India, Burma, Siam, French Indo-China, Tibet, Sikkim and Nepal in the last thirteen years. The author of many books on public relations in the Pacific area, Shen has just completed a work entitled "Tibet and the Tibetans" soon to be published by the university press of Stanford university.
