

# Candidates Join In Gotham Battle

## Crowds Cheer Adlai; Fill Madison Square

(P)—Governor Adlai Stevenson campaigned through New York city and New Jersey Tuesday and drew his biggest crowd Tuesday night at the Madison Square Garden rally for him.

The big arena's 17,500 seats were filled two hours before Stevenson was scheduled to speak and standees were filling the aisles. Thousands more were turned away. Double lines of police stood with arms linked in a human barricade telling the crowds, "Go back, the Garden is closed."

### Blasts GOP Promise

During the day, Stevenson said he would give his whole "heart, mind and soul" to attempt to end the Korean war. But Stevenson blasted what he termed Republican promises for a quick and easy end to the war.

Said Stevenson: "I can not promise you any of these things and no one can and no one should."

In New Jersey, Stevenson called for greater social advances, saying Communism can be conquered at home and abroad by eliminating its breeding grounds.

### Taft Blamed for Prices

Stevenson charged that if anybody is responsible for high prices it is Ohio's Sen. Robert Taft and what he termed the Old Guard Republicans.

Stevenson charged that, if Eisenhower wins, Taft will dominate the decisions of the national administration. The Democratic nominee said that if he wins the presidency his administration will be directed by himself alone and will give equal opportunities for all of the people.

### Impellitteri Sees City Sweep

Stevenson conferred with Jewish leaders and with New York Mayor Vincent Impellitteri. The mayor forecast the city will go "very big", as he put it, for the Democrats.

## Ike Hits Administration; Will Still Go to Korea

(P)—Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, Republican presidential candidate, is sticking by his promise to go to Korea if he wins the election. He hammered at that theme all day long as he toured New York's Queens borough and Long Island areas.

Tens of thousands of persons cheered the general as his car went along a 65-mile route.

### He's Still Going

The general said in Queens and in Mineola that he will go to Korea, if elected, to see at first hand what the problems are and what can be done about reducing casualties and bringing about peace.

Eisenhower insisted that he has not changed his viewpoints since winning the Presidential nomination and that he has not slid from "hither to thither" as he put it. The general said he has not changed a single view or conviction concerning what he termed the welfare, the need for recent government and leadership in Washington.

### Says People Let Down

Eisenhower also charged that the people have been let down by an administration which he said has robbed them of their pride in government. The general said part of what he termed the mess in Washington has been subversion and disloyalty and part of it has been waste and extravagance of tax money. But, he added, "Another part of it has just been sheer dishonesty."

Eisenhower said the purpose of the Republican campaign is to restore what he termed woodshed honesty in government. A government that is not respected at home, he said, will not be respected abroad.

Eisenhower will make a major address over radio and television Tuesday night.

His work with the relief com-

mittee has included the administration of a student clinic in Fukuoka and fund raising for a student tuberculosis sanitarium. Fujita is also acting as national student work secretary for the Japanese YMCA.

Prior to his visit to America, Fujita attended the general assembly of the WUS in Grenoble, France. He also participated in this summer's YMCA Youth Conference at Dassel, Germany.

# Ike-Nixon Expense Account Set Campaign Funds Hit \$998,967

(P)—A total collection of \$998,967 was reported Tuesday by two of Gen. Dwight Eisenhower's campaign organizations. Expenditures were set at \$739,268.

The Citizens for Eisenhower-Nixon reported contributions of \$886,747 in the seven weeks' period between September 9 and October 22. Campaign expenditures totalled \$675,019.

The National Professional committee for Eisenhower and Senator Nixon—formed September 22nd—received \$112,220 in the next month. It told of expenses for that period as \$64,249.

Only one comparable Democratic organization, the National Volunteers for Stevenson, has so far filed the required report of receipts and expenditures with the clerk of the House of Representatives.

This group listed \$9,000 in collections between August 11 and August 31, including \$5,000 from Gov. Adlai Stevenson. The organization's expenditures for the period: \$3,571.

These figures are in addition to the expenditures and receipts of such other party groups as the national committees.

## Reds Attack; Allies Firm

(P)—Chinese Reds have attacked the South Koreans along the central and eastern sectors. The fighting has shifted from the western front, where the Marines now have the situation in hand on the height called "The Hook."

On the central front, 700 Chinese made a sneak attack, without preliminary artillery fire. And according to front dispatches, the first rush pushed the ROKs off the high ground of Sniper Ridge. At latest word that high ground, known as Pin-Point Hill, was being pulverized by allied artillery.

Also on the central front, Allied troops counter attacked at dawn Iron Triangle near the town of an advance position on Red occupied Iron Horse mountain. Tank supported Eighth army troops also struck to retake two enemy held positions in another part of the old Iron Triangle near the won of Pyongyang. Front reports said the

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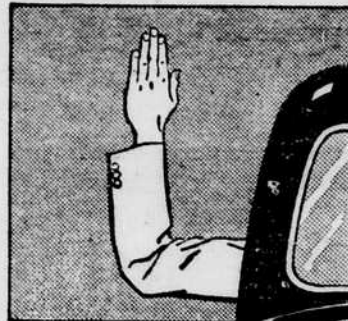

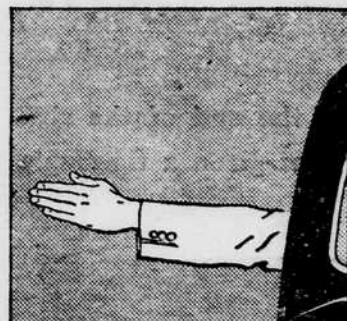
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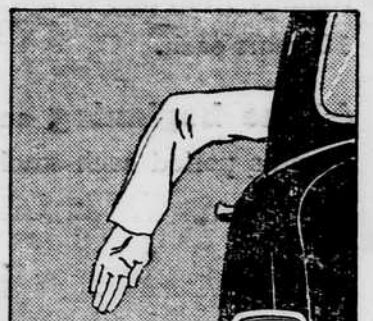
## This sign language can save your life
