Ducks Sharpen Rushing, Passing; Novikoff, Van Leuven Pace Rushers

After a light workout with no pads in Monday's practice session, the Webfoot gridders settled down to the business of preparing for the Tigers of College of Pacific with a lengthy passing drill and dummy scrimmage.

The three Duck quarterbacks, George Shaw, Hal Dunham and Barney Holland consistently hit ends Brethauer, Barnes, Lyman Johnson, and Streeter. Several of the backs were also on the receiving end of the tosses; Albright, Hodges, Novikoff, and Anderson.

The Ducks' loss was big in the Montana game as Don Sloan, the team's best returner of kickoffs received a broken leg while returning the opening kickoff.

The Webfoot running game continued to look good. The mail was packed by Ted Anderson, Tom Novikoff, and Dean Van

Leuven for the majority of the session. Novikoff is the leading rusher for the Ducks, having gained 233 yards in 65 attempts for an average of 3.5 yards. Van Leuven is second among the Duck rushers with 149 yards, but boasts the best average, having picked up 8.7 yards per carry.

In the line, tackle Len Berrie and center Ron Pheister were outstanding. Pheister suffered a slightly sprained ankle during the scrimmage.

Shaw Tops Scorers

Michigan State Tops AP Poll

(AP)—Coach Biggie Munn and his Michigan State Spartans continue to dominate the Associated Press football poll. For the third straight week, State has been voted the best in the country by 121 sportswriters and broadcasters. Except for the second week of the poll when Wisconsin spurted to the top, Michigan State has been voted the number one team.

The Spartans solidified their grip on the top rung with a crisp 34 to 7 decision over Penn State last Saturday.

Maryland moved slightly closer to the Spartans, following a 34 to 6 victory over LSU. The Terrapins now trail Michigan State by 26 votes. The previous week, State held a 50-point lead over Maryland.

Oklahoma remained in third place, followed by Georgia Tech, Southern California, Duke and UCLA. Three new members filled out the roster among the first 10. Purdue jumped into eighth place with Kansas ninth and Villanova tenth.
