

College Leaders Will Meet Here For Conference

The University will host the Oregon Federation of Collegiate Leaders when it convenes here this weekend for its annual meeting. The OFCL will hold meetings on Friday and Saturday.

The purpose of the group, according to Bill Frye, Oregon's chief delegate and convention host, is to serve as a medium for exchange of ideas between Oregon schools.

Discussion sessions are planned for Friday afternoon and Saturday morning. A general business meeting will also be held Saturday morning to hear summaries of the discussion sessions, presentation of resolutions and to elect officers.

An estimated 75 delegates will attend the convention, said Frye. All member schools will be represented at the convention. The federation is composed of 14 colleges and universities in Oregon.

Frye stated that the exchange assemblies between schools was but one of the accomplishments of OFCL.
