Fifth Job Conference Slated

The fifth annual federal service occupations conference will be held on the University campus Thursday, Nov. 6. The meeting was arranged by the federal personnel council of Portland and the graduate placement service of the University, with the cooperation of the teaching department.

Students who are interested in entering one of the federal fields are urged to attend the conference

and acquaint themselves with the service.

According to Karl W. Onthank, graduate placement director, students do not realize that the United States government is the nation's largest employer, providing work for approximately 10 per cent of the workers.

Faculty members are invited to all sessions, particularly the luncheon which will be held in the Student Union at noon. Reservations may be made at the office of K. S. Wengert, head of the political science department.

A general meeting will be held at 2 p.m. in the Commonwealth auditorium, followed by section meetings in the fields of accounting and auditing, science and science options, secretarial and office management, social science and general business, and personnel administration, psychology and public relations.

In addition to speakers from the federal services, former University students who are now in the services will answer questions at the section meetings.

Those students who are planning to take the civil service examinations for junior professional

assistant and junior management assistant should attend the conference, according to Onthank.

Bruns Says Stricter Discipline Now Effective in ROTC Classes

"It is nothing new. We are merely enforcing the regulations." That was the statement of Colonel Emory L. Bruns, head of the military department, in regard to the announcement of stricter adherence to military discipline.

Col. Bruns said that many cadets at summer camps were found to be lax in their courtesy and discipline and a directive had been received stating that ROTC should prepare the cadet for military life and therefore should teach correct procedure.

The move, said Col. Bruns, is not to punish cadets but rather to give the opportunity of learning the correct military courtesy and discipline.

The directive states that the first cadet noticing the instructor's entrance will call "attention", whereupon all cadets will stand at attention until otherwise directed.

Upon completion of each class, the directive continues, the instructor will call the class to attention before dismissal. Oral reci-

Student Court Cracks Down On Campus Traffic Violations

Student traffic court, composed of Fred Turner, Sally Haseltine, Malcolm Montague, Carl Weber and Don Rotenberg, met Wednesday night and send cards to delinquent violators.

The cards requested the students to appeal either to student affairs before November 5 or to appear in court on that date, at its next regular session.

Many of the violators were people for whom there was no registration or who had failed to put their stickers on the windshield. The fines for these people will be doubled. Of those not registered many are non-university students, and their separate cases will be turned over to the Eugene police.

"The tickets of those student offenders who neglected to register their cars and therefore cannot be traced through the student traffic court files will be traced in the Eugene police files and the files of the various secretaries of state," according to Fred Turner, head of the court. The tickets will then be turned over to Dean Jones, assistant to President Newburn.

According to Turner it will then be only a matter of time until violators are apprehended and requested to report either to the student affairs office or to traffic court.

Violators who are found to be chronic offenders will be requested to report in person to Ray Hawk or Golda Wickham, associate directors of student affairs.
