

Houses Are Asked to Help Finance Ore-Nter This Year

The Ore-Nter, new student handbook, is currently asking student living organizations, classes and honoraries to donate funds to help finance the handbook.

Living organizations are asked to donate any set amount, but only to give what they wish, Donald DuShane, director of student affairs, said.

The campaign for funds for the

Ore-Nter is an annual affair, according to DuShane. Four years ago, the ASUO executive council, now the senate, voted to revive the Ore-Nter which had been combined with the "Welcome Book" during the war years. The ASUO and administration agreed to publish the book jointly and the ASUO agreed to provide some of the additional funds it would

cost to publish the Ore-Nter. The University was to provide the remainder.

The book costs about \$1,200 to print, DuShane stated. If Tom Shepherd, Ore-Nter business manager, should fail to collect any money this year, the publication would probably revert to the University, DuShane said, which would continue publishing the

book, but would have to curtail it from 120 pages to about 50 pages at the most.

When asked how the \$5.00 pre-freshman rush or pledge fee paid by fraternity and sorority rushees fitted into the finance of the Ore-Nter, DuShane said that one or two dollars is given back to the house and the rest is used to do promotional work for the Greek-

letter houses and for University promotion, for which no state funds are allocated. He added that some of the money was used for the freshman picnic during New Student week and that a small portion went to the Ore-Nter, but that there was no set amount for this purpose and it was very little.

KNOW?

- That more than 3 dollars in taxes of all kinds will be collected this year for every 2 dollars that were collected in 1949.
