Governor Stevenson has proved himself one of the most independent men ever to appear in American politics. Stevenson has steadily put principle above the search for votes while his opponent has surrendered to the most unsavory elements of his party. Governor Stevenson has not hesitated to take issue with his Democratic predecessors and has differed with other powerful Democrats; General Eisenhower has declared his support of ALL Republican candidates. His "great crusade" has degenerated into nothing more than a drive to replace Democrats with Republicans—not just bad Democrats with good Republicans but any Democrat with any Republican, good, bad, or intolerable.

Ike Muffs Big Issues

General Eisenhower has been vague and inconsistent on most issues, has borrowed, without understanding, Democratic planks on a few, and has been wrong on the most crucial questions before him. He has been wrong in his wavering and in consistent foreign policy pronouncements, wrong on tidelands oil, wrong on civil rights, wrong in surrendering to Taft, wrong in absolving Nixon, wrong in embracing Jenner, wrong in accepting McCarthy.

On specific issues, only a thunderous silence has issued from the Eisenhower camp punctuated by the vicious, ill-conceived and pathological blasts of such all own demagogues and practitioners of the smear as McCarthy, Cain, and Kem. These crusaders in Eisenhower's cause are the men who would enact Eisenhower's policies into legislation—if policy he has, for in truth, Eisenhower has many — one for Louisiana, one for New York, one for California, and each different. This is no crusade; this is the Double Deal.

Unholy Alliance

Original Eisenhower supporters have been thrown over at every turn in order that an unholy alliance may be the more quickly consummated with the neolithic, predatory, isolationist elements of the Republican party. So that McCarthy may be endorsed, Jenner embraced, Kem lauded—Is it a surprise then, that honest Republicans and honest Independents have been shocked at the mighty and sudden transfiguration of the hero they sought to create and the crusade they, at one time, honestly endorsed. It is no surprise that these people are now turning with confidence and respect to support of the candidacy of Adlai Stevenson of Illinois.

Gais Demo Support

It is little wonder that Wayne Morse, Senator William Langer of North Dakota, and others are amazed that the candidate they helped to nominate has surrendered unconditionally to Robert Taft and crew and has become a docile and ordinary thing in their hands. Only slightly more amazing is the pell-mell rush of Jim Crow Democrats to embrace Eisenhower and his "crusade." These men, too, are well-known Crusaders and should feel at home with the General. For years, they have crusaded against equality and for bigotry, for discrimination and against understanding. Their covert affiliation with the most tainted and unappetizing elements of the Republican party has at last become overt and ob-

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stamp scandals have been exposed under his administration. The day a national magazine hit the newstands carrying an article by Stevenson telling of his cleaning out of gambling the FBI raided the state for slotmachines.

While the tax dollar of the American taxpayer is being eaten by corruption and waste of the present administration, inflation is eating away at the residue after taxes.

More Money, Less Goods

The inflation caused by the Korean war is in simplest terms the taking of a proportion of the consumer goods and services out of the production stream while taking a proportionally less amount of money out of the income stream. This leaves more money to bid for less goods and drive prices up. If incomes increase are not as great as price rises, then the command a person has over the goods and services available is less and real income depreciates.

As these goods that must be distributed get scarce the administration followed a policy of inflation or a reduction of real income. However, those groups with greatest economic strength can bolster their position with pay demands, while those on fixed or relatively fixed incomes feel the pinch.

Here, I would like to inject another personal experience. Last year with the symposium group of the University I spoke to a business group in Portland on this issue. In that talk I criticized the administration for (1) talking too long to set controls in motion. It took from June to November to pass a controls law in the Democratic congress. Yet executive order could have gotten controls moving on a voluntary-moral suasion basis. (2) Controls were slow in application. It was January before any controls and then they were not retroactive to June 1950. (3) Controls were placed first upon the wrong items. The major industries that produce for war have had a greater inflation than the general economy. Yet they are easier to control and police because there are fewer of them.

While the other students spoke out against all controls, the president informed me that an OPS official sat in the audience. When the question period came, the OPS reserved all his comments for the other students. My criticism was ignored.

Policy of Inflation

This is an indication that the government has followed a policy of inflation in order to reduce the standards of living caused by the Korean war to the benefit of those groups who could hedge on inflation and to the detriment of those who live on fixed incomes.

This is what has been going on internally. Outside the U. S. the Democrats have an equally poor record. Since the end of WW II over a dozen countries have had the Iron or Bamboo curtain drawn around them.

This is too critical an hour in our country's history to entrust our destinies and our children's destinies to a soldier who has served his country well in war but has not mastered the arts of civilian statecraft. This is no time for anything less than the wisest, steadiest, and most responsible leadership we can find. Therefore I shall vote for Adlai Stevenson. I urge all thoughtful Americans to do the same.

U. S. policy statement of defense was an island chain in the Pacific, excluding Korea. We backed up the policy by withdrawing our troops. The communists attacked. Then after the military had long indicated that Korea was "untenable" the politicians sent the troops back.

Korea is an example of the containment policy the U.S. has been forced into after losing the peace. Containment means the U. S. with its military, industrial and financial strength must be prepared to fight the enemy wherever he chooses to attack. To follow this policy means extensive foreign commitments of our existing resources. NATO, ECA, Greek-Turkish aid, Pacific Pact are examples of the commitments under containment.

Foreign Fight Paramount

However, our country has a limited amount of resources. This country can not carry a large foreign commitment and expect to assume extensive domestic commitment of our available resources. Moderation must exist in one of the two fields. Since the foreign fight for freedom is of paramount importance, curtailment of home projects should be expected if we are to be safe in the foreign sphere.

As communism has spread abroad under this administration for the last seven years, so have they been careless at home with communists.

Atomic secrets leaked through Julius and Ethel Rosenberg. Judith Coplon passed government secrets to her Russian boy friend.

America's number one communist, Eisler, entered the U. S. by letters of recommendation from Eleanor Roosevelt only to flee the country seven years later in 1948 to become Propaganda Director of the Communist East German Government. Harry Bridges had his deportation stayed by Roosevelt in the 1930's only to have the Justice Department press suit in 1950 for perjury of communist membership when applying for American citizenship.

These are examples of making up, for past errors.

Approves Loyalty Board

The only corrective measure taken by the administration was installation of the Loyalty Review Board forced on the president by the 80th Congress. But this was only a token response by the administration. Judith Coplon passed the Loyalty Board as did one George S. Wheeler who left his military government post in Germany to take asylum behind the Iron Curtain.

The record is not bright. But one last comment on Adlai Stevenson. At the Democratic convention he accepted the party's candidacy for President but wished those words spoken by another man. At the time of his acceptance he still didn't want to be president. Maybe deep down inside he still doesn't.

Certainly, if corruption is to be dealt with, inflation is to be tackled, moderation made in our domestic commitment to safeguard us abroad, removal of undesirables within our government structure, then the Republican Party should be given the vote of the people November 4.

Opponent's Stand On War Mocked

(P)—Gov. Stevenson has accused Dwight D. Eisenhower of shifting his stand on Korea—and making political promises now to end the war there quickly.

The Democratic presidential candidate may have more to say on the subject in a Philadelphia speech Wednesday night, but advance copies were not available.

While campaigning through eastern Pennsylvania, Stevenson quoted Eisenhower as saying on June 5th there was no present answer to the Korean war. Now, almost in November, Stevenson said his opponent was saying he could bring the war to an end with speed and honor.

General Strives For Bigger Vote

(P)—The Republican presidential candidate has been waging a double-edged campaign during the day in battling for New York State's 45 electoral votes—the biggest bloc in the nation.

Dwight Eisenhower campaigned through two vital New York counties, Westchester and the Bronx. In effect, this part of the Eisenhower campaign represented the battle for the entire state.

Eisenhower was in Westchester trying to build up an even bigger G-O-P margin. He slammed away at the administration—called it "tired and shopworn"—and promised to clean out what he termed the mess in Washington.

flashed, the thunder roared and killed a chigger."

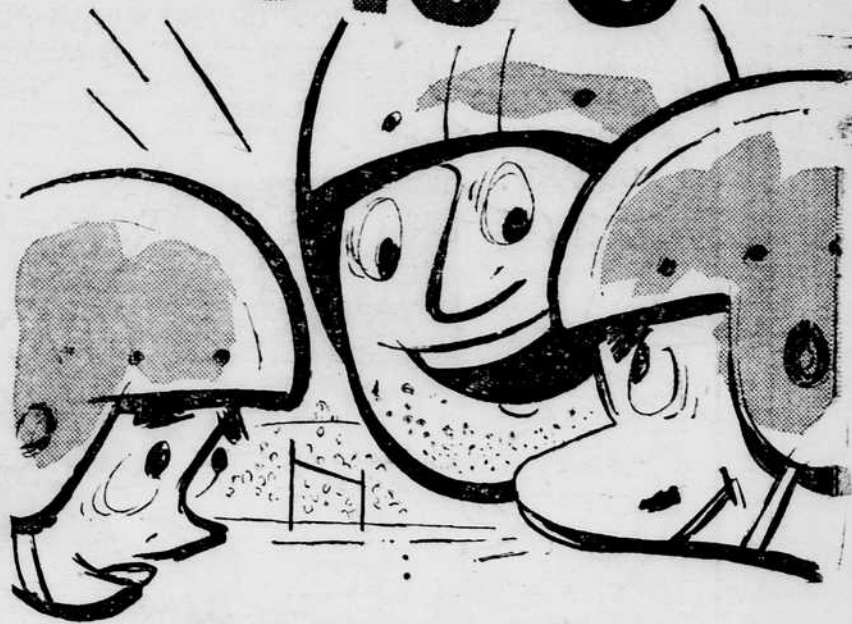
The vice president added that because President Harry Truman is telling people the truth and the facts on his whistle-stop campaign, some people have accused him of conducting a low-level campaign.

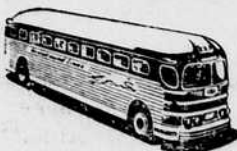


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
