

Phi Delts, Chi Psi Score Victories In Mural Play

Phi Delta Theta and Chi Psi scored impressive victories to high-light intramural volleyball action Wednesday afternoon. The Phi Delts swamped Pi Kappa Alpha while Chi Psi scored two thrilling wins over a favored Tau Kappa Epsilon team. In other games Alpha Tau Omega defeated Delta Tau Delta, Sigma Phi Epsilon downed Sigma Alpha Mu, Kappa Sigma bumped Sigma Chi, and Pi Kappa Phi won by forfeit over Phi Kappa Psi.

The Phi Delts blasted the Pi Kaps 15-4 and 15-7 to remain undefeated in volleyball competition. Jim Gibson, Dick Morse, and Bob Wagner were the spiking stars for the winners. The defensive work of Daryle Nelson was another main factor in the Phi Delt win.

Chi Psi Upsets Tekes

In the best played match of the day the underdog Chi Psi squad came from behind in two consecutive games to down their favored opponents. Playing with only four players, the winners had to fight their way from behind a lop-sided 12-6 deficit to win the second and deciding tussle if their set with the TKE's, 17-15. Sparts Lead In Yardage

NEW YORK (AP)—The nation's top-ranking team, Michigan State, is still grinding out yardage at the best rate in college football.

Statistics released Wednesday by the NCAA service bureau show the unbeaten Spartans from East Lansing once again at the head of the pack in total offense. State last Saturday rolled up 495 yards in crushing Penn State to boost its per game average to 468 yards. San Jose State is second with 456, Oklahoma is third with 435 and Maryland fourth with 430.

Michigan State is high in rushing and passing but is not the leader in either department. Despite its poor day against Southern California last week, California is still the rushing leader with an average of 305 yards per game — four yards above runnerup San Jose State. Oklahoma has moved into a challenging position with 295 yards, thanks to a tremendous output against Kansas State last Saturday.

Oklahoma is scoring at the highest rate. The Sooners have rolled up 210 points in five games — an average of 42 points a game.

Webfoots Hit Fundamentals; Montana Movies Reveal Errors

With hopes of an upset win over the College of Pacific Tigers from Stockton, California, Oregon's Ducks worked on both their offensive and defensive patterns in a lengthy drill session, Wednesday afternoon.

The Webfoot coaching staffs, disappointed with the showing of the gridgers in their 14-14 tie with Montana last Saturday, put emphasis on individual assignments in an attempt to iron out the many mistakes, which were visible in the movies taken of the game.

Again, the defensive will be faced with the task of putting the stopper on a powerful running at-

tack. The COP attacks will be led by right halfback Tom McCormick, who has rambled 434 yards for a 5.4 average per carry. Coach Len Casanova had his defenders working on bottling up the line against a freshman offensive unit.

On the offensive agenda, concentration was placed on developing scoring punch. During the last few contests the Ducks have been potent down to the twenty yard stripe, but from there on it, it's

been a totally different story. Against California the Webfoots garnered 275 yards, but tallied only once. Shutout by Washington's Huskies they picked up 326 yards and in the Montana tilt 302 yards showed only two tallies.

George Shaw, the Duck's leading passer, was again hitting his receivers with regularity. Monte Brethauer, top pass catching end, is off the injured list, and should be ready for full time duty against the Tigers.

Passing Strong Point

The Oregon passing attack has accounted for almost two thirds of the total offense during the season. Through the air lanes the Ducks have gone for 1023 yards, while on the ground they've only garnered 554. With a successful running game to back up the passing, the Webfoots could muster enough power to outscore the fast, rugged running attack of the COP eleven.

Injuries which have plagued the Oregonians all season, will again hamper the squad in Saturday's dash. Things do look better than they have the past few games, though. Dick Stoutt's broken leg has mended and he should be ready for action. Manning Barber and Emery Barnes who saw no action last week, and Bret Bauer and Anderson, who saw limited time, had the pads on Wednesday.

Wednesday, Anderson broke his nose, but it was a clean break and should be mended by game time. Ron Lyman reinjured a bad shoulder, but the extent of the damage isn't known. Don Sloan, who suffered a leg fracture in the Grizzly encounter, will be out for the season, which is another bad break for the Oregon team.

In two previous meetings with the COP eleven Oregon had gained a split. The locals registered a 7-6 triumph in 1946, and dropped a 34-6 contest last year.
