Stevenson Blasts Ranting GOPs

Gov. Adlai Stevenson blasted Republicans for saying that the Truman administration has been soft to Communism in a last minute attempt for Pennsylvania's votes.

While whistle-stopping through the state, Stevenson reeled off a list of anti-Communist actions taken by the Democrats. He said the "old guard" Republicans had opposed them all, and the record showed that it was the Democrats who recognized the Communist menace and took steps to meet it.

He called the Republican argument "an insult to the people's intelligence," and Republican actions "shameless hypocrisy."

"Aid that saved Greece and Turkey, the Marshall plan, a firm stand against the Russians in Berlin, the North Atlantic treaty and the Mutual Security program can all be credited to the Democrats," he said.

Stevenson asked where the "old guard" had been and he shouted to a crowd in York, "They fought against every one of these measures."

He further declared it was under the Democratic administration that American Communist leaders and spies for Russia were jailed.

Ike Denounces 'Scurrilious' Tactics

Dwight D. Eisenhower indirectly accused Pres. Harry S. Truman and Gov. Adlai Stevenson of "unrestrained slander," and "the most scurrilous campaign in American political history."

Eisenhower spoke Thursday night at Madison Square Garden in a final attempt to swing New York's 45 electoral votes to the GOP yesterday marked his third day of campaigning in the state.

Although he mentioned no specific Democrats by name, he maintained that their "wild and vile" attacks did not bother him. He told the crowd that he had been "worked over" in his time by "poison pen" experts in Nazi Germany and Russia.

"But until our success in this campaign drove our opponents to desperation, no one had ever engaged in such unrestrained slander as to charge that I would trim my principles to run for office," he declared.

Eisenhower had a ready answer to Stevenson's comment that he and other Republicans have implied that there is an easy way to end the Korean war.

Questions for student discussion will be raised by Nestingen at this time and immediately following his talk students will break up into buzz sessions to discuss the social, moral, mental and spiritual aspects of this topic.

Leaders of the buzz sessions will be Marilyn Paul, Oregon State college; Betty Jo Yaw, Lewis and Clark college; Myrla Thomas, Oregon; and Shirley Hutchinson, Willamette university.

From 2 to 2:30 p.m. workshops will be held to provide students an opportunity for individual discussion. Theme of the workshops will be "How Can We Help Ourselves and Others Develop Christian Emphasis in College Life." Subdivisions of this topic will be academic life, religious growth, social life and campus activities.

from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. The conference will again adjourn until after dinner. At 6:30 p.m. Nestingen will address the re-assembled group on "The Art of Purposeful Programming." His talk will be followed by swapshops on 'Y' program strategy.

Closing worship will be held at 9:30 p.m. At 10 p.m. a light snack will be served. Delegates from other colleges will be housed in sororities and men's dormitories. Marie Jordan is chairman of the housing committee.

The second day of the conference will open with a pancake breakfast at 8:30 a.m. Donna Mast is food chairman for the breakfast which will be held in Gerlinger hall.

Mokato Fujita, a World Student Service Fund traveller from Japan, will address the conference at 9:30 a.m. Fujita will speak on the subject "Do We Understand the Wants and Needs of the World University Student?"

Sunday worship will be held at 10:45 a.m. William C. Jones, assistant to president of the University will close the conference with a talk on "Purposeful Living."

'Sing the Story' Provides Theme For Noise Parade

Next Friday's Homecoming noise parade will follow the Homecoming theme of "Sing the Story, Oregon," with each entry slated to provide themes for its parade vehicle.

Recognitions numbers for the floats, which were given at the time of pairings, plus the names of the organizations and the names of the theme of the float must appear on both sides of all parade entries. The parade will start at 6 p.m., and will end at the site of the bonfire rally.

The noise parade route begins on 19th ave. to Alder, traveling north on Alder to 13th. The parade will continue east on 13th to University, south on University to 19th, from where it will go to the bonfire rally at 15th and Columbia streets.

Judges of the floats will be placed on the lower porch of the Student Union facing University St. Floats will be held at 13th and University and will go past the judging stand one at a time. Judges are E. R. Bingham, D. H. Sites, Len Casanova and Milton Dieterich, all members of the University of Oregon faculty.

Three cups will be awarded to first place winners at the variety show following the bonfire rally. Noise parade co-chairmen Joan Cartozian and Norma Hultgren will award the cups.

Judging will be based on sustained noise in the one block judging interval, appearance of the float in relation to its theme, spirit of those on the float and those following the float and ingenuity and originality in noisemaking.

Rules for the parade are that all vehicles must be one single conveyance. Semi-trucks are permissible but no extra trailers are acceptable, according to the co-chairmen.

The parade is to form on University St., with the head at 19th St. Floats are requested to resume their lanes in line on a first-come-first-serve basis at 5:45 p.m. it was stated by the parade chairmen. At the completion of the parade all floats are not expected to stop until they have passed University and 19th streets.

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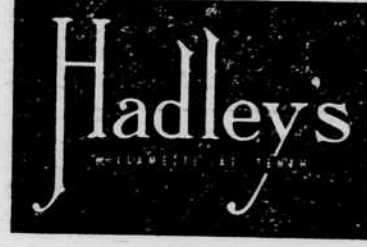
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
