Demo Campaign Targets Re-elected on GOP Ticket

Two of national Democratic leaders prime targets during the campaign, Senator William Jenner of Indiana and Senator Joseph McCarthy of Wisconsin, were re-elected in the senate races. Democratic Governor Henry Schricker conceded early Wednesday that Jenner had defeated him for the Senate seat.

McCarthy was running well ahead in his bid for re-election over Democrat Thomas E. Fairchild in the Wisconsin Senatorial race. In a

prepared statement McCarthy said:

"A New Day"

"The election of General Eisenhower, and most probably a Republican senate and house, more than justifies my faith in the intelligence of the American people. This

is a new day for America. The real task of the Republican party now begins."

First GOP Triumph

The first GOP triumph was in Connecticut where Senator William Benton was beaten by William Purtell, a manufacturer, for a full six year term. The second Republican seat was gained in Maryland where representative J. Glenn Beall defeated Democrat George Mahoney in a close fight. Senator Herbert O'Connor, Democrat, did not seek re-election.

In New York, John Cashmore, the Democratic candidate for the senate conceded to the Republican incumbent, Irving Ives.

Republican Sen. H. Alexander Kennedy Smith of New Jersey was re-elected.

Malone Defeats Mechling

In Arizona's contest for senator, the Republican incumbent George Malone defeated Democrat Tom Mechling — the young unknown who surprised everyone by winning in the primaries.

Michigan's Blair Moody, Democratic incumbent, was trailing Charles Potter, Republican for the Senate. Ohio's Republican Senator John Bricker was running well ahead of Democrat Michael DiSalle.

While the Republicans won some victories in the senate races, they also lost several.

One of these losers was the man who was as instrumental as any other in getting General Eisenhower into politics — Senator Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts. Other Republican Senators behind were: James Kem of Missouri; Zales Ecton of Montana, and Harry Cain of Washington. Cain refused to concede defeat even though Democratic Congressman Henry M. Jackson was 40,000 votes ahead in early Wednesday morning tabulations.

GOP MAKES GAIN IN CONGRESS RACE

(AP)—Republicans have made decided gains in the battle to give Dwight Eisenhower a GOP congress but at 2:30 a.m. the outcome was still in doubt in both House and Senate. One report indicated a 49-46 Republican edge might develop, with one Independent.

Six Democrats have been elected to the Senate and with 35 holdovers, that makes the Democratic total now 41. The Republican total is also now 41 with 26 holdovers. Also very likely, the Senate may be split right down the middle with 48 Republicans and 48 Democrats. Fourteen contests are undecided.

If there is a 48-48 split in the Senate, Oregon's Senator Wayne Morse would be in an extraordinary position of power. Morse, who quit the regular Republicans during the campaign and fought against the election of Eisenhower, now labels himself an independent.

TV Amendment Fails in Eugene

No television antenna will be erected on Spencer's Butte.

Eugene voters defeated the city charter amendment 5377 to 2135, with 46 out of 52 precincts reporting.

One other city measure, a \$1,000,000 electric and water district enlargement, passed 5575 to 1357.

V. Edwin Johnson, Independent, was re-elected mayor. Johnson was unopposed.

Democrats had a slight edge in the House with 102 contests still undecided. Democrats elected 168 representatives with 230 previously in the House. Republicans elected 165 with 200 seats formerly held.

The Senate division previously found the Democrats, 50-46.

Polls Show Langlie To Have Tight Race

Washington's Republican Governor Arthur Langlie was having a tight race with his Democratic opponent, Hugh Mitchell, in that state's gubernatorial race. Langlie had a lead of 7,530 votes with 1,470 of the 4,381 precincts reported.

Associated Press returns for governors in 30 states at 1:30 a.m. showed Democrats had elected six governors with no gains and Republicans had elected 12 governors with one gain. Democrats were leading in five states; Republicans in seven.

Milk, School Measures Behind

Late returns from downstate Oregon precincts put the milk control measure and the school district reorganization bill behind early Wednesday morning.

Results from 1,103 of the state's 2,269 precincts give "no" votes a lead of 5,036 in the milk measure and a 4,277 margin in the school bill. A total of 85,348 negative votes were cast in the milk measure compared to 80,312 votes for the passage of the bill. The school bill is lagging by a vote of 78,751 to 74,474.

In other measures, the following bills were leading in approval: legislative truck tax, uniform standard time throughout the state,

liquor by the drink and legislative reapportionment.

Six measures in addition to the milk and school re-organization bills, appear to be headed toward defeat. They include: appointment of the state superintendent of public instruction, cigarette taxation; anti-parimutuel amendment to the state constitution and abolition of weight-mile taxes as proposed by the trucking industry.

Thornton Leading John McCourt; Newbry, Unander Ahead in State

Republican candidates for two state offices have pulled away from their Democratic opponents, but in the third Robert Y. Thornton, Democrat, is gaining on Multnomah County District Attorney John McCourt in the race for state attorney general.

According to figures from 1,155 of the state's 2,269 precincts, Thornton has pulled to within 2,182 votes of McCourt and the Democratic state representative from Tillamook is gaining steadily from downstate returns. McCourt has 90,316 votes to 88,134 votes for Thornton.

Sig Unander of Portland has a substantial lead over his Democratic opponent for state treasurer, Francis Lambert of Portland.

Unander has received 110,751 votes to 68,663 for Lambert.

Incumbent Earl T. Newbry leads Democratic Candidate Edith Green in the race for secretary of state by a vote of 109,349 to 77,653.

Ike's Son Sends Korean Congrats

(P)—From Somewhere in Korea today, Major John Eisenhower sent his congratulations to his father, president-elect Dwight Eisenhower. In a telegram to his parents in New York, Major Eisenhower said "Dear Folks. My heartiest congratulations. My thoughts were with you all the way." The message was signed "Johnny."

Oregon Precincts Give Ike Big Lead

Returns from 1,136 of Oregon's 2,269 precincts gave Dwight Eisenhower a commanding lead in the state early Wednesday morning.

The general was never headed in the state. The first returns, from predominantly Republican Malheur county, gave him 653 votes to Stevenson's 274.
