Hale Kane and Theta Chi rolled to impressive volleyball victories Wednesday afternoon as two out of the scheduled six games were decided by forfeit. Hale Kane smashed Susan Campbell hall into submission, 15-5 and 15-4.

Theta Chi bounced the Sammies 15-3 and 15-7; French Hall outlasted Stitzer Hall 15-11, 10-15 and 15-12; and Pi Kappa Alpha trounced Pi Kappa Phi 15-0 and 15-3. Sigma Phi Epsilon won over Sigma Chi by forfeit as did Alpha Hall over Barrister Inn.

Hale Kane again demonstrated their skill by blasting Susan Campbell in a very decisive manner, 15-5 and 15-4. Bob Muirhead was the individual standout for the winners with a lot of help coming from Orlando Mathias and Charles Oyama. For the Susies, Jim Jolley played well.

Caution Pays Off

Theta Chi's cautious but effective style of playing proved too much for the Sammies. The Theta Chi's crushed their opponents by 15-3 and 15-7 scores. Bill Harber, Judge Elderkin and Dick Kusson were the team leaders for the winners.

In the closest match of the day, French Hall finally managed to edge out a tough Stitzer team, 15-11, 10-15, and 15-12. Page and Scott led the way for French while big Max Anderson stood out for Stitzer.

Pi Kappa Alpha, usually on the short end of the score, was not to be denied on this afternoon. The Pi Ka's, led by the serving of Thurston Dunn and the spiking of Gerard Jeub, outmaneuvered and completely outclassed Pi Kappa Phi, 15-0 and 15-3. At one time in the first game of the set Dunn served 13 consecutive points. Pi Kappa Phi fell behind at the outset of both games and was never in contention.

Wednesday afternoon's practice session put emphasis on offensive passing drills and a defense to put the stopper on the Cougar offensive machine, which finally came to life in its last two engagements.

On the offensive side of the field, Len Casanova had his charges working hard in hopes of penetrating the Washington State pass defense which is rated third in the Pacific Coast Conference.

Dunham Calls Signals

Handling the signal calling duties for the first half of the afternoon was Hal Dunham, senior quarterback, who had a good afternoon hitting his receivers. His most consistent target was Monte Brethauer, the Duck's top pass catcher.

Brethauer, with 25 completions and 296 yards, is ranked third in the west and is tied for fourteenth spot in the nation.

The Oregon defensive unit worked on formations they hope will halt the Cougar's Michigan style single wing attack. With the Washington State passing finally beginning to show a return to last year's effective play, the Duck defenders will have quite a task to carry out come Saturday afternoon.

Working against a freshman offensive unit, the defensive eleven smoothed out their individual assignments and hope to pull a few surprises on the invaders from the Palouse country. The Cougar squad will be the first single wing team the Webfoots have faced since they held UCLA to 13 points in the season's opener.

Injuries Plague Squad

Injuries, which have plagued the Oregonians all season, will again weaken the already shallow Duck squad. As of Wednesday it was doubtful whether Emery Barnes, defensive end, and Cece Hodges and Ted Anderson would see much action. Brethauer worked without
