Peru's Buildings

(Continued from page one) lems, and man's capacity for creative expression.

The first series of slides shown were those taken in the highlands of Peru. Here, architectural forms exemplify the three themes. The city of Machu Pichu, for example, is an answer to the problem of survival, to the needs of a group of people to protect itself from attacks of other groups. Machu-Pichu lies on a hill overlooking a narrow canyon. We know it is a planned city, Hayden said, because the building material had to be brought from great distances and up the hill.

The lecturer remarked that the Indians of Peru and Mexico had only the most primitive of tools. Stone carving had to be done, he said, by rubbing one stone against another.

Some of these stone buildings present what has been called a "random appearance"; various sizes of stone are used in the walls and no effort is made to achieve continuity of line. Hayden suggested this might be the result of a deliberate protection against earthquakes.

From Peru the audience was taken in the visual trip to Mexico. Mexican architecture has combined successfully architectural and ideological meaning.

As an example of this richness of meaning, Hayden showed a series of serpent heads in Teneyuca. These heads, varying in size and position, have numerical significance.

DU to Accept Scholarship Applications

Applications for the Delta Upsilon scholarships amounting to \$500 are now being accepted. The scholarship will be awarded to six students from colleges in the Pacific coast and adjoining states.

Any male students above freshman standing are eligible to apply, the applicants not being limited to members of Delta Upsilon.

No special application form is necessary. A letter including biographical data, the student's college transcript, college activities and honors list, a statement of reasons why the applicant believes himself qualified for the award constitute the application.

A picture of the student should accompany the letter and recommendations of two faculty members and two student leaders. The applicant should also request the dean of his school to write a letter of recommendation or comment to be mailed separately.

The applications must be filed by Dec. 1 with the Delta Upsilon Foundation, PO Box 1633, Columbus, Ohio.
