English Steel Mills Up for Private Auction

(AP)—The conservative government of Great Britain will put English blast furnaces and steel mills up for private auction any time after next Easter. The mills have been nationalized since 1949.

The period for the sale was made known Thursday when the government published its bill to reverse the steel nationalization law passed by the previous laborite government.

Apart from asking the public to invest private cash in the business the denationalization scheme will make little difference to steel plants. The industry will remain under strict government control, just as it has been since 1939.

Ike Accepts Truman Offer

(AP)—President-elect Eisenhower accepted President Truman's invitation to a White House conference on domestic and international problems. Eisenhower suggested that the meeting be held during the week of Nov. 17.

With the selection of this date, it appears likely that he will not make his planned trip to Korea before the meeting with Truman. In his reply to Truman he suggested that his appointive officials be allowed to sit in with Democrats in high posts. The general told the president that he needed reasonable time for choosing these assistants.

Eisenhower said also that he shared Truman's hope that this nation is united in its struggle for freedom and peace. He told the president that "in this way, the conference can achieve maximum results."

Michigan Governor Unofficial Victor

(AP)—G. Mennen Williams, governor of Michigan, issued a cautious victory statement Thursday.

"The unofficial returns indicate a slender margin of victory. I believe and expect that this will be confirmed by the official canvass, he declared.

Meanwhile, counters rechecked the vote that apparently gave Williams another term as Michigan governor. Unofficial returns gave Williams a margin of 7,531 votes over Republican, Fred Alger, Jr.

Special Election Due in Illinois

(AP)—A special election is in the offing in Illinois to fill the congressional post left vacant by the death of Democratic Representative Adolph Sabath early Thursday.

Sabath, 85, was the dean of the house, and had just been reelected by a ratio of two-to-one. He died in Bethesda Naval hospital of complications resulting from a major operation last summer.

The Illinois congressman had served 45 years in Congress, and was head of the powerful house rules committee which decided legislation to come up for action on the house floor.

Robbins Will Address Investment Forum

E. C. Robbins, instructor in economics, will address the Eugene Public Investment Forum meeting in the Roosevelt junior high school auditorium at 8 p.m. Tuesday on the subject "Banks: Their Function and Service."

The senate heard a report from Jody Greer, ASUO senator-at-large, on the \$6 social fee which is collected from all girls when they move into the dormitory at the beginning of the year.

Miss Greer said that Carson hall does not have a budget, such as the senate's, but rather estimates the cost of major items and leaves the remainder to be used as necessary.

Following are the estimated costs for this year:

- Oregana—\$262.
- Homecoming floats (one for each floor)—\$160.
- Homecoming sign—\$40.
- House dances (2)—\$600.
- Junior Weekend floats (one for each floor)—\$140.
- Support for a foreign student—\$633.

Miss Greer explained that the \$633 for the support of the foreign student was decided on two years ago and the girls in the dormitory now did not make the decision.

Other expenses listed by Miss Greer were refreshments for frosh desserts, flowers, and incidentals. She said that some of the money may go to purchase a set of encyclopedia.

Conference Audience Hears Advantages of Federal Service

Federal employment today offers the young men and women the opportunity to serve their country while serving themselves, Willard C. Jones, dean of administration, told an audience of about 150 people at the opening session of the fifth annual conference on university level occupations in the federal service in the Pacific Northwest yesterday afternoon in the Commonwealth auditorium.

"The most significant aspect of federal employment," Jones said, "is the feeling that you have invested your life in something worth while."

The federal employee also has a high degree of professional security, he continued. A good salary and attractive employment conditions are important in the consideration of lifework since the future pattern of employment, that of working for someone else, is already established for the majority of American workers, Jones said.

Responsibility and Influence
A position of such responsibility and influence is rated high in the social status of any community, he declared.

"But more important," Jones said, "you are not only contributing to your own livelihood but are also working for the general social good through the contributions of government work to a better life."

He asked for straight thinking on the question of taxes, calling taxation the payment of the individual to the government for a variety of services which the public needs and wants. Such indispensable items as police and fire protection and sanitation, without which the modern city could not exist, are all supplied by the government and paid for through taxes, he added.

Co-operation
Social improvements must come through co-operation, and government is the device man has selected to gain such co-operation, he said. The contributions of the government, which is "ultimately we" the American people, must be expanded because of the fundamentals in this civilization man has made.

Jones advocated government expansion in these fields: educational opportunity as the birthright of every child; health through the investigative research carried on by government workers; the welfare

of children and care of the aged; reclamation of present wastelands to utilize their potential productivity, and flood control. "These jobs are too immense to be handled by the individual and so must come through government," he maintained.

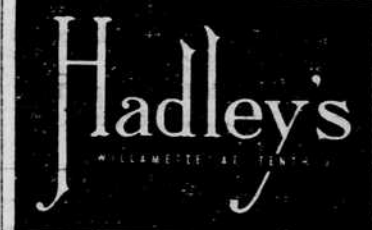
Changes in transportation, communication and business during the last several decades have been reflected in the growth of government and the methods of handling current social problems, Jones said. Living in this world of revolution requires government activity in our present economic society and this activity will provide employment opportunities to interested and qualified young people.

Best Brains
"And government is seeking the best brains of the best men and women in the country to fulfill these opportunities," Jones concluded.

The general meeting was followed by sectional meetings dealing with the opportunities in and requirements for specific fields of government work. These group discussions were presided over by University faculty members and the representatives from a number of federal bureaus answered the questions of interested students.

A coffee hour reception was held in the Dad's Lounge of the Student Union at 4 p.m. for the visiting federal representatives. Government agencies represented at the forum included the U.S. forest service, production and marketing administration, Bonneville power administration, soil conservation service, bureau of land management and general government services.

Individual discussions between students and these representatives were programmed for the afternoon.
