Cougars Arrive Today For Hayward Workout

Rebounding Washington State college, with a pair of smashing victories over Oregon State and Idaho, rolls into Eugene today for an afternoon workout on Hayward field. The Cougars, who clash with the University of Oregon Webfoots at 1:30 p.m. Saturday on the same greensward, have been installed seven-point favorites for the Pacific Coast conference skirmish.

The Cougars, a strong comeback club, overpowered Oregon State, 33-20 two weeks ago after trailing at halftime, 20-13. Last Saturday they trip-hammered their Moscow, Idaho neighbors, the Little spuds, 36-6 in a game that figured to be close.

Washington State absorbed four straight defeats before the wins, however. The Cougars fell before Southern Cal, 35-7; Stanford, 14-13; Baylor, 31-7; and Ohio State, 35-7. Trailing Stanford 14-0 at the intermission, the Washington club scored twice the first two times they handled the ball.

Frosh Seek Second Triumph Today At Expense of Scoreless Rooks

Oregon's freshman footballers wound up practice for today's clash against the Oregon State Rooks with a light tapering off drill Thursday. Duckling Coach Bill Bowerman ran his squad of 31 a few times around the track, had them practice kickoff returns, and finished up by sending them through a few plays.

Moomaw, Heinrich Lead All-America Coast Candidates

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Associated Press All-America picking process in the Far West finds Quarterback Don Heinrich of Washington and Linebacker Donn Moomaw of UCLA the leading candidates of the region. For the first time this season, the name of Fullback Johnny Olszewski of California is missing from the recommendations of the AP board of nominators for the coast.

Olszewski still leads the coast conference in rushing with 656 yards in 116 carries. But he was slowed down considerably on two straight important weekends by Southern California and UCLA. To top his troubles, Johnny O fumbled at crucial times in both games. But Heinrich and Moomaw have been picking up steam.

The latest All-America nominations include some other prominent names — Paul Cameron of UCLA for one. Peerless Paul was handicapped by injuries earlier in the season. But then came his play against California Saturday—and zoom Paul became the Associated Press back of the week. Named with Moomaw on the defensive platoon were two halfbacks, Lindon Crow of Southern California and Milt Davis of UCLA. Jimmy Sears of USC still is the chief Western candidate for All-American safety man.

The Oregons will be favored in the 2 p.m. contest on Bell field in Corvallis, but Bowerman figures the Rooks will be much tougher than when they lost to the Ducklings, 31-0, on Hayward field in Eugene last month.

Scoreless Wonders

Besides the loss to Oregon the OSC club has succumbed, 13-0, to the Pacific university JVs and 58-0 to the highly-touted Washington Pups, and will be trying especially hard to end the season without a defeat as well as to even the "Little Civil War" series.

The Ducklings have a 1-1 record, including the win over the Rooks and a 21-6 loss to Coach Phil Sarboe's Humboldt State varsity at Arcata, Calif.

Two of Oregon's starting backfield men—Mel Buchanan from Redwood City, Calif., and Dick Pavlat from Astoria — remain on the injury list and there is little

likelihood that they will see much action today. Pavlat, who may still kick extra points, has a broken hand, and Buchanan has a bruised hip. Both injuries were suffered in practice sessions.

Duckling Halfbacks

Taking their places at the half-back positions will be Dick James from Grants Pass and Chuck Boydston from Wilmington, Calif.

The Ducklings would like to be able to take it easy and be in good shape for next Saturday's clash against the Pups at Seattle but the injuries, plus a likely improvement
