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Lights Off to Save Power

By turning out classroom lights, would the faculty save enough to help the Northwest's power pool? The answer, gathered from three different sources, was a unanimous "yes."

E. G. Ebbighausen, associate professor of physics, said electricity would be saved, but that the wear on fluorescent light tubes would be greater after continued turnings on and off. His statement was backed up by the Eugene Power company.

I. I. Wright, superintendent of the physical plant, also agreed with the saving of current. The rooms with incandescent bulbs would very definitely show a saving of electricity, he said.

The wear on fluorescent lights would not be as great now, since most of the University fluorescent light tubes are the new slimline

type. The older types, however, would show wear if turned off and on many more times than they are now.

The general consensus of the "board" of three was to turn off the lights when the classroom will be vacant for an hour or more—but if the room is to be used the next hour it would be more economical to leave them on.
