Halftime Show To Feature Stunts, Music

Oregon-WSC halftime activities will include card stunts, presentation of the homecoming queen and her court, and several selections by the band.

The "O" section of the game will be filled with students in white shirts or blouses. Coats or jackets may be worn during the game, but must be removed for halftime, said Al Goldenberg, chairman of pre-game and halftime activities.

Instructions for Students

Instructions for students in the "O" section are:

1. Put the card under the collar of the person directly in front of you.
2. Stunts will be done without use of a microphone, so it is important that everyone watch for the signals.
3. There will be four cards placed on each seat. Be sure to get the correct card at the correct time.

Since the section is not reserved, Goldenberg urges that all students planning to participate in the stunts arrive by 12:30 p.m. at section "O" on the 50 yard

Early Burning Attempt Futile

Metz added that the fire was "tremendous," burning longer and higher than usual because of the automobile tires used in its construction.

Captain of today's game, End Ron Lyman, crowned Queen "Punky" Boner who introduced the members of her court.

"I want only to please you, the students and alumni, with a victory tomorrow," said Coach Len Casanova during the rally. "We hope the frosh victory is indicative of what will happen tomorrow. I think it is," he added.

Noise Parade Won By Phi Delts-Judson

"Win the day, with Crimson and Gray", entered by Phi Delta Theta and Ann Judson house, took first place in Friday night's noise parade.

The float was built around an old steam tractor equipped with several whistles. In addition to the whistles, the float sported a fog horn and various other noise making devices. The tractor, decorated to look like an old-fashioned wood-burning railroad engine, also spouted smoke.

The parade wound its way through fog around the 18 block long parade route. The parade was the start of the Homecoming events and doped the weekend with screaming sirens, low-voiced fog horns, fire crackers and the music of the Oregon band.
