

Campus Who's Who

The campus "who's who" gets its name from the Oregon term of-"anyone who dates." According to the poem on the index page of the "book", pigging started when a shy UO freshman, Homer, claimed he had to visit his pig every weekend, rather than brave the teasing of his friends about a girl friend.

Thus began the tradition of Homer's going "pigging" when he took his girl out.
