
Anthology to Publish Two Students' Poems

Poems written by two speech majors will be published this year in the Annual Anthology of College Poetry, according to an acceptance slip received Wednesday.

"Foem" by Karl Harshbarger, a junior from North Liberty, Iowa, and "Vignette in Surrealism" by Joseph Wolvek, a graduate student from Brooklyn, N.Y., were the two accepted by the National Poetry association.

"The Anthology," wrote Dennis Hartman, secretary, "is a compilation of the finest poetry written by college men and women of America." It represents every section of the country, and selections were made from thousands of poems submitted, he said.


