The leading contenders for the runner-up slot, the University of Idaho Vandals and the University of Oregon Webfoots, knock heads tonight and Saturday in a two-game series which can go a long way in determining the place horse. Starting time for both Mc-Arthur court games are 8 p.m. Oregon State's Rooks and the Duck Frosh meet in the opener tonight at 5:45 and Everybody's Drug of Eugene is billed for the Saturday prelim, also at 5:45 p.m.

Holland Doubtful

Bruised Barney Holland, Webfoot guard who collided with the floor Saturday at Corvallis, experimented with a protective face guard Thursday, but it is doubtful whether or not he will be allowed to play in the opener. Otherwise Bill Borcher will open with his regulars-Keith Farnam and E& Halberg, forwards; Chet Noe, center; and Bob Hawes and Kenny Wegner, guards.
