(AP)-The house alcohol committee of the Oregon legislature decided late Monday to introduce its own liquor by the drink bill. The proposed bill would keep socalled bottle clubs and the master-locker system, but forbid any discount on purchases by dispensers.

The discount feature has been a major point of disagreement in public hearings on liquor by the wrink legislation. The state liquor commission has opposed the proposal to grant a 15 per cent discount on bulk purchases. It contends this would result in the . late's losing at least a half milhon dollars a year.

The bill may reach the house floor next Monday.

Things look pretty bleak for Oregon and the rest of the Northern division teams under Washington in the ND standings as far as overhauling the Huskies is concerned; but there is plenty of interest and competition concerning the three way race for second.

Getting back to the undefeated Washington quint, we see little or no hope for anyone replacing the leaders as Northern division champ. Only two quints, Oregon and Oregon State hold a mathematical chance of winning. In OSC's case, there is only hope for a tie and then a victory in the ensuing playoff.

The Seattle five currently possesses a 10-win and no-loss slate. Oregon, in the second spot, is riding on six wins and four defeats; and the Aggies, although in fourth spot, are still eligible with a 4 and 6 record. A U of W win or an OSC loss would eliminate the Beavers. Any assortment of three Oregon losses or a like humber of Washington wins would drop the Ducks. Both situations are highly improbable

But getting back to the second place-that's where the real race lies. It would be a logical speculation to state that the three teams involved, Oregon, Idaho and OSC, might go right down to the last game before the runner-up spot is decided.

Oregon, although it is two games ahead of its nearest rival, could suffer considerably in its forth coming schedule which puts the locals on the road for five out of their last six games. We can get a good idea of what a prolonged journey away from home can do to a good club by looking at Idaho, who just finished a disastrous invasion of the Willamette
