Gavilan Floors Foe Four Times In TKO Victory

CHICAGO—Courageous Chuck Davey gave it all he had tonight but welterweight champion Kid Gavilan proved too rugged for the Spartan from Michigan State. The result was a 10th round technical knockout scored by Gavilan to retain his crown at Chicago stadium.

It was the first pro loss for Davey.

Gavilan floored Davey four times to live up to the three to one odds posted for the scrappy Cuban. The first knockdown saw Davey scramble to his feet after absorbing a nine count in the third.

From the third through the eighth, Gavilan appeared to toy with Davey. Frequently, Gavilan switched to the southpaw style regularly employed by Chuck.

Then, the end came with lightning rapidity in the ninth. At the outset of the round, Davey went on the offensive, connecting with several rights and lefts.

Suddenly, Gavilan clipped Davey with a short right uppercut. Davey hit the deck. He took a count of

Ducks To Attempt Four Game Sweep

The Oregon cagers went through a brisk workout Wednesday in preparation for their two game invasion of Washington State College at Pullman this Friday and Saturday night.

Fresh from two decisive victories over the highly touted Idaho Vandals, Oregon will be favored to make it four straight over the Cougars. If the Webfoots succeed, it will be the first time in history, and quite a feather in the cap of Sophomore Coach Bill Borchers.

Won One Game

But even though the Cougars have won only one game in their last ten starts, they are never taken lightly by the opposition. This is due to their wily veteran coach, Jack Friel, who has been head man since 1928. Friel has a habit of making the second game of a series plenty tough by devising special strategy after the first test.

The Cougars gave Washington's

league leading Huskies one of their roughest nights last Saturday by staying in the lead for three quarters before bowing 69-

Kieth Farnam played two of his best games against Idaho and proved himself a fine rebounder who should take some of the load off Chet Noe and Ed Halberg.

Lloyd Lewis Leads IM Cage Scorers

Lloyd Lewis, freshman basketball player from French Hall, is currently leading the intramural scorers with 51 points in 3 games, according to unofficial statistics including games up to Monday, Feb. 9.

Runner-up in scoring in total points is Sam Duncan, Sigma Hall, who has collected 46 tallies in four contests. Ron Phillips, Sigma Chi, and Bob Hinman, Phi Kappa Sigma, are tied in the average column, with 14 points per game.

Behind Lewis, who has 22 field goals to his credit, are Phillips, Lowry Hoyer, Campbell Club, and Sam Duncan, Sigma Hall, who are deadlocked for second in the field goals column with 18.

Paul Bonney, Merrick Hall, has collared the most free throws, 15. Norm Ruecker, Alpha Hall, is next with 12; followed by Ken Torgerson, ATO, with 11.

Torgerson so far holds the record for high score in one game, 23. One point behind is Lewis with 22.
