College seniors, both men and women, who will graduate in June with required physics and mathematics credits may also apply at this time for commissions to be awarded following graduation. June graduates will enter graduate meteorology srhool in September.

The June class was established specifically to provide an early entrance into weather school for mid-term 1953 graduates. Several weeks are required to process the application forms and obtain approval from the participating university.

Colleges and universities offering government-paid basic meteorology courses are: Massachusetts Institute of Technology, New York university, University of Chicago, Pennsylvania State college, UCLA, Florida State university, University of Washington and St. Louis university.

Weather officers in the Air Force are now permitted to rise to the rank of full colonel, either in the field of command or in the field of research.

During graduate training in either basic or, later, advanced meteorology, all tuition and other expenses are paid by the govern-
