A conference luncheon and business meeting will be held in the SU ballroom at 12:15 p.m. Following this, roundtable discussions will be held by the delegates.

Conference delegates will attend a banquet tonight at 6:30 in the SU ballroom. Oregon foreign students will address the group on the subject of "Secondary Education in My Country."

Business sessions and panel reports will occupy the delegates Saturday morning.

Draft Test Applicants Face Mar. 9 Deadline

Students who plan to take the selective service college qualifications test must have their applications filed by Mar. 9, selective service headquarters has announced.

The test will be given April 23. The results will be reported to the student's local draft board for consideration of his deferment as a student.

ROTC deferments were reopened to students on Feb. 16, Col. E. L. Bruns, head of the military department, has announced. According to Colonel Bruns, up to 85 percent of the freshmen men will be eligible for military deferment.

Acceptable Work

Sophomores who are doing acceptable work and are possible candidates for the advanced ROTC course will also be eligible for deferment, Colonel Bruns stated. Junior and senior men formally enrolled in the advanced course are granted deferments.

Conditions of military deferments, according to Colonel Bruns, include the students signing an agreement saying he will apply for and complete the advanced course, if accepted. This will give him a military deferment for his sophomore year. If accepted for the advanced course the student agrees to accept a reserve officer's commission with the proviso of a minimum of two years active duty. The commission lasts for eight years, starting the day it is granted.

You Can Retire

If the man decides to retain his commission and remain active in the inactive reserves, he will be

eligible for retirement with pay. The size of the retirement payments vary with the number of years on active duty, Colonel Bruns said.

Also emphasized by Colonel Bruns was the fact that if freshmen sign the agreement saying they intend to apply for advanced ROTC and then do not the military department must cancel their deferment.

A. L. Ellingson, counsellor for men, said that military deferments, currently give students the best chance of remaining in school for four years.

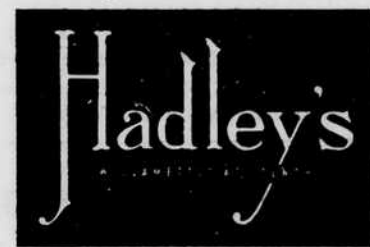
Not Rough

When asked about the number of students who have been drafted from the University, Ellingson stated that the draft boards have not "been as rough as was expected" on the students. However, he warned that men who have received orders to take their physical for the draft must do so.

He explained that when a student receives his orders to report for his physical he should request a letter from the registrar's office for his draft board stating that he is enrolled in school and giving his grades. The student should also write a personal letter to the board asking for consideration of his student standing, he said.

Ellingson added that under the present regulations set up by selective service, freshmen men are eligible for one full year of college.

Students with questions concerning their draft status should contact the office of student affairs, Ellingson said.
