

3 Debate Teams To Enter Tourney

The University forensic squad is attending the annual Far West regional debate tournament at Linfield college today and Saturday, according to Herman Cohen, director of forensics.

The group is competing for speaking titles with teams from eight states at the tournament, the largest forensic contest held this side of the Mississippi. Participants in former years have included speakers from Oregon, Washington, Montana, Idaho, California, Utah, Nevada and New Mexico.

Students making the trip include the three debate teams: Bruce Holt, freshman in pre-law, and Paul Ward, freshman in political science; Phil Cass, freshman in pre-law, and Don Mickelwait, sophomore in pre-law, entered in men's junior division debate; Loretta Mason, freshman in speech, and Elsie Schiller, junior in journalism, entered in women's varsity competition.

NAACP Status Study Planned

Final action on recognition of a campus chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People is expected at Saturday's student affairs committee meeting.

J. V. Berreman, sociology professor and NAACP adviser, will present the group's answer to criticisms by committee members. The faculty senate committee appointed last week to investigate student affairs committee policy on recognition of campus organizations will also attend the meeting.

The student affairs committee is considering the NAACP request for the second time in two weeks. Last week the committee tied three to three in a vote to grant the group recognition. Because of the tie vote, it was decided to hold another hearing which Berreman could attend to present an argument favoring recognition.

Arguments against the NAACP center on two clauses in the group's constitution and its national affiliation. Both clauses have been changed since the committee voted against the group last spring.

The arrangements of Miss Blakeley's visit are being handled by the YM. Students who wish to talk to her should make their appointments in the YM office, Walker said.

Cars will be provided for transportation. Anyone unable to make his appointment should call Miss Holm at the Kappa house, 5-6711.
