Student Injured In Auto Mishap

Everett J. Jones, senior in biology, was seriously injured in an automobile accident in Idaho during spring vacation.

Jones, on March 29, was riding in a car that failed to make a turn on Highway 93 near Hailey, Idaho. Jones was taken to Sun Valley hospital where he was treated for concussion.

The Oregon student, who had been skiing at Sun Valley, regained consciousness by the next morning. His condition was described as "still serious but improving."

Police reports indicated the car had gone out of control on the turn and left the highway about 150 yards beyond, rolling about 50 feet. Jones was thrown from the car.

Jones is a resident of Boise, Idaho. He lives at Gamma hall on the campus.
