Student Helped By Transfusions

Nadine Crabtree, sophomore in English, is reported "in better condition" by the nurse in charge at Sacred Heart hospital. Blood transfusions were discontinued Monday until further notice.

Student response to the Emerald's story last week asking for blood donors having Miss Crabtree's rare blood type, B negative, was "wonderful," the Eugene blood bank reported. Nearly 40 students registered to donate.

Miss Crabtree, who has been in the hospital since Mar. 28, is suffering from a condition in which her bone marrow does not manufacture blood and daily transfusions were necessary, according to N. P. Sullivan.

All-Campus Vodvil Show Theme Set

"Let's Do It Again" has been selected as the general theme of the all-campus vodvil.

The representatives established the following rules governing acts for the vodvil:

1. No previous campus talent can be used as an act in itself.
2. Participants in the act itself must number from four to thirteen.
