
Mansfield and Sampson are making the annual tour of Britheld at 7:30 p.m. Monday, in Ger- ish debaters sponsored by the Institute of International Education. They are touring the Western states while a second team meets teams on the campuses of Eastern universities.

The first British team to participate in this international program came to American in 1923 for a single appearance at Bates college in Maine. Speakers are selected from Cambridge and Oxford for two out of every three years and the third year are chosen from one of the British dominions or a provincial college in the British isles.

A pair of Australian debaters appeared at the University last spring and Edinburgh university in Scotland was represented in 1950. No international debate was scheduled for Oregon in the intervening year.
